Hanna Selected Public Works Director

After conducting wide-ranging search that generated applicants from Carolina to California and places in between, Lewisville Town Manager James Ayers announced the hiring of Jon Hanna as the new town public works director.

“Following a rigorous series of interviews, exercises, and presentations, we found our ideal candidate close to home,” Ayers said.

“Jon has already hit the ground running in his new role,” said Ayers. “For example, on his first day he already went out to Ridgcrest to assess the street tree issues and prepare short-term

Blood Drive Set for May 17 at MAWCC

If you are looking for a way to give back to your community, the Town of Lewisville is hosting a blood drive from 1 until 5:30 p.m. on Wednesday, May 17 at the Mary Alice Warren Community Center in Lewisville.

For more information or to make an appointment to donate, donors can go to www.redcrossblood.org and search by zip code or sponsor code 'Town of Lewisville' to make an appointment.

With a simple blood donation, donors have the ability to help save the life of someone who could be a coworker, loved one or neighbor.

"We urge community members to donate blood and help ensure that patients in local hospitals have a supply of blood ready and waiting before an emergency occurs," said Town Manager James Ayers. "There's no better feeling than knowing that your blood donation



may give someone a second chance at life."

Blood is a perishable product that can only come from volunteer blood donors. With someone in the U.S. needing blood every two seconds, blood products must be constantly replenished, according to the Red Cross. Blood is routinely transfused to patients with cancer and other diseases, premature babies, organ transplant recipients and trauma victims, according to the Red Cross.

The short amount of time it takes to donate can mean a lifetime to a patient with a serious medical condition, according to the Red Cross.

The Town of Lewisville urges eligible donors to join in the selfless act of giving blood.

Donors of all blood types are needed, especially those with types O negative, B negative and A negative. According to the Red Cross, type O negative is the universal blood type that can be safely transfused to anyone, and is often used to treat trauma patients.

Lewisville Civic Club to host 16th Annual Charity Golf Tournament

No Trash or Recycling Delays

Bulky Item Pickup to Begin April 17

The next Bulky Item Pickup event will be Monday, April 17. Those residents wishing to participate in the pickup should have all acceptable bulky items curbside by 6 a.m. Items placed out late, will not be removed.

Bulky item collection events are held a few times per year and provide Lewisville residents an easy and convenient way to dispose of unwanted, large items that would otherwise need to be taken to the landfill. Town Hall has

received recent calls about the event, so Town staff is anticipating high participation from Lewisville residents.

This event is intended for disposal of items too large to fit within a trash cart - items such as large pieces of furniture, carpet, mattresses, box springs and white goods.

Town staff advised the "rule of thumb" is to avoid placing bags of trash, televisions, cardboard boxes, lumber scraps, clothing,

books, construction debris and other prohibited items out for the collection. If Waste Management sees a contaminated collection pile, the site will not be serviced.

BULKY ITEM COLLECTION Monday, April 17 - 6:00 a.m.

Acceptable Items for bulk collection

Household furniture, lawn furniture, carpet, extra large rugs, bicycles, toilets, grills (no propane) mattresses and box springs (limit of 2 sets per household)

White Goods - Stoves, refrigerators, freezers (doors must be removed), water heaters, dishwashers

**All items must be in plain view
and can not be bagged or boxed.**

Items must be placed within three feet of the curb.

Items NOT Accepted

Televisions, computers, mirrors or glass of any kind, household waste, yard waste, dead animals, tires, hazardous waste, chemicals, paint, microwaves, electronic waste, car motors, clothing, shoes, books, general recycle items, liquid waste, batteries, motor oil and any equipment containing oil or gas, lumber scraps, construction debris, bagged trash, cardboard and cardboard boxes

Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Training Course Set for May 5-7 at MAWCC

Become a member of YOUR Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). The fastest response to any emergency, in your home, your neighborhood and our community starts with You!

Do you know...

- 1) How to use a fire extinguisher?
- 2) How to splint a fracture or control bleeding or stabilize an injured person until the fire department and EMS arrive?
- 3) How to turn off the gas, electricity and water to your home...at the meter?

By becoming a CERT-trained volunteer, you become part of the solution, not the problem. The CERT Program is a national program of volunteers trained in disaster preparedness and emergency response. CERT members are a force multiplier for our emergency responders enabling them to concentrate on the more complex, essential and critical tasks of responding to disasters. You will learn basic disaster response skills such as team organization, disaster medical operations, fire safety, and light search and rescue. Using these skills, before, during, and after disasters, CERT volunteer teams perform basic response activities, including checking in on neighbors, distributing information to the public, supporting emergency operations centers, and helping to manage traffic and crowds. This training will help you to assist your family, neighbors, co-workers, and other community members during emergencies when professional responders may not be immediately available to provide assistance.

CERT course having graduated 27 of your neighbors last spring. Will you be next?

- Friday May 5, 2023 at 9:00 a.m. – 6:15 p.m. (Class sign-in starts at 8:30 a.m.)
- Saturday May 6, 2023 at 8:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.
- Sunday May 7, 2023 8:00 a.m. – approximately 4:00 p.m.

You must attend all days to become certified in the program. Class is limited to 25 participants.

To register for the course, you must first be registered in the NC State Training, Exercise, Response Management System (NCTERMS). This is a web-based training calendar and personnel response profile database used to track our training. You can reach this registration portal at <https://terms.ncem.gov/TRS/>. Simply follow the "Create an Account" instructions to get started. Once logged into the system, click on Calendar, then change the month to May and scroll down to May 5, CERT - Community Emergency Response Team Basic Training Class (NC-317). Click that link then the one at the bottom that says "I Want to Register" and you're done.

and long-term fixes, he started work on organizing the activities of the department, and he is preparing for the special certifications that come with the job.”

Hanna is no stranger to the town, as he has served as a contractor for the town’s landscaping in years’ past.

“Jon has demonstrated his professionalism and strong work ethic here in this town, and now he will be leading our public works department in 2023 and beyond,” Ayers said.
