Winners of this art show will be announced at the reception and will have their work displayed at the community center until May 22.





This film is rated PG-13 with a runtime of 2 hours 7 minutes.





"We started with a only handful of food trucks," Events Coordinator Stacy Howard said about the event. She said that as the event has grown over the years, there

has been an effort to include more variety in the kinds of food trucks.

"It's a great way to support local, small businesses, including the many food trucks, breweries, and wineries that participate," she said.

Howard said that around 2017 was when the Town began bringing in a stage for the band, so that the audience could hear and see them from almost every part of the park.

This will be the third time the Band of Oz headlines the Street Party & Food Truck Festival.

Take a Hike, Sing a Song, Fling a Disc

Outdoor enthusiasts in Lewisville are going to have more to do come Fall, as an expansion at Jack Warren Park is scheduled to break ground late this Spring.

May - June 2024

Because of the enormous generosity of Mary Alice Warren, and the partnership with the NC Parks and Recreation Trust Fund, the Town of Lewisville will improve over 15 acres of land for park users to enjoy.

New additions to the park include an amphitheater for small events and gatherings, an 18-hole recreational disc golf course, and several thousand feet of natural-surfaced walking paths.

The amphitheater will feature a small covered stage with grassed, terraced seating and will be available as an outdoor classroom and event space for many different opportunities.

The walking trail will not be paved like the existing paths at Jack Warren, but will have a mulch surface and will wind through the existing forested area. This will be managed as a nature trail and will take advantage of the great natural topography. While sharing the space, the path will maintain a safe distance from the disc golf course.

The disc golf course will feature holes from 60' to 200' and will be appropriate for all skill levels. There will also be two holes that are wheelchair accessible. It looks like I have about five months to learn to play!

In 2023, the Town of Lewisville collaborated with the Forsyth County Board of Commissioners and county staff to execute an interlocal agreement to implement a Voluntary Agricultural District program within the Town of Lewisville limits. The program aims at protecting farmland from non-farm development. Interested landowners may contact the Forsyth Soil & Water Conservation District at 336-703-2850 for more information.


