From Your Mayor **Civil Public Service**

s I have mentioned before, I grew up in the Florida Keys, about halfway between the Miami mainland and the island of Cuba. Our TV reception required an antenna that was mounted on a steel pole extending from the ground to the roof, and we could only receive one station at a time.

If we wanted to change channels, one of us, most often me, would have to cover ourselves with OFF mosquito repellant and go outside to turn the antenna pole with one hand while frantically slapping swarms of mosquitos away with the other until we got a picture. If we turned the pole too much, we would get Cuba TV. If we dallied too long adjusting the antenna angle, we would have mosquito bite welts for a week.

The first political debate I remember watching on TV was in 1960 between John Kennedy and Richard Nixon. My mom, dad, and I sat in the living room, we had a black and white television (probably a 17" GE in a laminated wood cabinet).

But back then, and for the next few years, the debates we watched were civil and respectful. TV networks rarely covered the day-to-day speeches of candidates on the primary stump. That's maybe why we were shielded somewhat from the evolution of the civil discourse of that time to today's angry partisan demagoguery that is destroying the foundations of our political process and the faith we need to have in our democracy.

OK, throw cold water on me. But my point is that while so many have become indifferent, almost accepting, of the toxic tone and disrespect so prevalent in today's national, and often state politics, it has not become acceptable here in our little town.

In Lewisville we have intentionally avoided the kerfuffle we see all around us. We have been successful in preserving the civil principles of disagreeing without becoming disagreeable, debating based on informed opinion and respectfully resolving those issues that are most important to our town's future.

To me this is so fundamental for anyone engaged in public service and should be among our most important values to practice and protect as part of an elected body serving our residents.

In a few weeks you will have an opportunity to participate in the noble calling of public service should you choose to file to be a candidate for election to our town council.

But before you do, please consider my musings above. Serving our residents should not be a stage for partisan politics, a platform for political performance, a pathway for advancing personal agendas or a resume builder for something else.

The common bond shared by our council today, and those before us, is that here in our little town we have an unselfish commitment to work together to make the lives of our residents and their families better.

In 1960 Nixon and Kennedy clearly had a clash of ideologies reflective of that time and the positions of their political parties. But looking back now, it was how they debated those ideologies and positions that strengthened our democracy. I believe this practice is fundamental for good governing. Particularly in our little town of Lewisville. Just something to think about.

(Fire) Ants Marching

While I hope my column will become a regular feature in our newsletter, I definitely don't want to make it a downer. Unfortunately, the subject of this article absolutely classifies as a bummer.

Recently, we've started noticing fire ants popping up in a few locations around Lewisville. To be specific – Red Imported Fire Ants – these are the hateful little buggers that first showed up in Mobile, Alabama several decades ago and have steadily moved north. Their spread is aided by warm weather, cargo traffic, and transport of nursery stock.

While the infestation at this point is minimal, we'll want to be vigilant to hold them off as long as we can. I lived in the fully occupied upstate of South Carolina for 13 years and trust me, fire ants can make outdoor life miserable. The mounds we have found to date are near highway interchanges or in new neighborhood landscaping.

Keep an eye out for the very distinctive mounds the fire ants create. They're much more substantial than the innocent little ant mounds you're used to and when disturbed, fire ants will boil out like angry yellowjackets. Don't panic when you find them.

There are several options for treatment that are readily available and even a few organic products that are proven to work. PLEASE – purchase a product that is specifically formulated for fire ants and follow the label! Our native ants are beneficial insects and we don't have to wipe out everything that crawls to keep this one bad invader out of our town.

Notes from your Environmental Conservation and Sustainability Committee

Sustainability can happen in many ways. Usually, we use this space to promote our recycling events, but with none coming up until October, let's talk about WATER.

Summer's here! Time for beach trips, slip 'n slides, and car washes. Water is life. Keeping our water sources clean is a big part of sustainable living. Here in North Carolina, we are lucky to escape the drastic droughts that plague other states. But we shouldn't take that for granted.

For watering gardens, try to wait for Mother Nature's rain. If you have a dehumidifier, use that water for your plants. A rain barrel is another way to collect water and reuse it. If you must use a hose, don't leave it unattended. It's easy to walk off and end up flooding. When cleaning, try using vinegar or baking soda. Natural cleaners work well and are easy on our water and septic systems. If washing your car at home, watch the soapy runoff over the driveway. It could harm nearby growth and carry chemicals into storm drains.

Speaking of drains, toilets are busy all year long. Remember, no wipes down the pipes. There is no such thing as a "flushable" wipe. The same goes for non-toilet tissue. No tissues, or there'll be issues.

Water play is a summer must for kids, but plastic pools and slip 'n slides will kill the groundcover if left in place. Beach goers, have fun! But watch that plastic toys don't wash away in the surf and that all picnic items go home with you or land in approved trash or recycling bins.
