
But you know what? This isn't who we really are. I truly believe we're better.

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CPR Class Empowers Residents

The Town sponsored an inaugural CPR class led by the Lewisville Fire Department on November 3, 2023, at the Mary Alice Warren Community Center.

The class was taught by American Heart Association certified instructor Douglas Fanning, with the Lewisville Fire Department.

Instruction covered several life-saving techniques that included activating the emergency response system and providing chest compressions and ventilation to adults, children, and infants. Participants in the class were able to practice these techniques on new state-of-the-art manikins provided by the Lewisville Fire Department. This ensured that participants both understood the steps

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Winter Weather Tips

from the Lewisville Fire Department

Here are several helpful tips selected by Lewisville Fire Department Chief Darin Needham and Assistant Chief Jesse Levy to keep you safe during the colder winter months:

- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet from all heat sources, including fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators, space heaters, or candles
- Never use an oven to heat your home
- Turn space heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed
- Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected each year by a professional
- Never use candles for emergency lighting. Use flashlights and stock up on extra batteries
- Make sure you have a backup battery for your smoke alarm
- Use surge protectors
- Consider unplugging appliances
- Connect appliances to portable generators with heavy-duty extension cords
- Don't fuel your generator when it is running; spilling gas on a hot engine can cause a fire

Seriously.....It's Snow Joke

I guess it's conceivable you're reading this as we dig out from an epic early snowstorm. Assuming that is not the case and we haven't yet seen any appreciable flakes, we need to talk about snow events in Lewisville: what to prepare for and expect if (or when) the white stuff comes. Those of us who have been in the area a while understand that we just don't know what to anticipate. In December 2018, we had 13" of snow. Last year, we had 0". Most years are somewhere in between, with some sleet and freezing rain mixed in. That variability means we don't get a lot of practice, and a changing climate also means we can't rely much on historic patterns. All we can do is have a good plan -- and we've been planning for months -- working with contractors, refining maps, procuring salt and supplies, coordinating with other government entities, and more.

In Lewisville, we have three main classes of roadway: state, town, and private. On our website, we have a color-coded map that identifies every street and who maintains it. NCDOT is responsible for treating and plowing state roads, and they have a hierarchy of classification. They will generally clear "secondary" roads in town once their "bare pavement" group is complete. The bare pavement roads include 421 and Yadkinville Road and consist of those roadways that are 'essential to the movement of intrastate traffic. Secondary DOT roads, such as Shallowford and Lewisville-Clemmons, are those that link the main arteries. Town-maintained streets are cleared by our contractors as soon as it is safe for them to do so. Private streets must be cleared by private efforts.

Of course, we all have a part to play when winter weather descends upon our town. To do your part -- first -- please have patience and understand everyone is working as hard as they possibly can. Secondly, have everything -- cars, trailers, goals, trash cans, etc. -- moved off the street and out of the cul-de-sacs. If a driver can't safely plow a street, it will be skipped. Don't be "that guy" and the reason your neighbors don't get their street cleared. Also, remove anything from the right-of-way that you don't want damaged. Don't assume a snowplow driver can see your stuff, your kids, or you. They are laser focused on the few feet in front of the plow and it requires exhausting efforts.

Let's all work together, be patient, keep it fun, and enjoy the beauty of the season.


