Bulky Item Pick-Up

The next Bulky Item Pick-Up will begin Monday, October 14. Lewisville residents wishing to participate in the pick-up should have all acceptable bulky items curbside by 6 a.m. on that day.

Bulky item collection events are held twice a year and provide Lewisville residents with an easy and convenient way to dispose of unwanted, large items that would otherwise be taken to the landfill. This event is intended for the disposal of items too large to fit within a trash cart.

A list of acceptable and prohibited items is on page 7. If Waste Management identifies a contaminated collection pile, the site will not be serviced. This list and more information can also be found at lewisvillenc.net/bulky.

I come from a blended family.

My mother was a college-degreed Republican teacher. My father was a high school drop-out Democrat renegade. They met at the Army's Air Force base in Presque Isle. Maine during WWII. Dad got the bombers ready for the trip across the Atlantic to Great Britain. Mom kept the paperwork for the base commander.

During their off hours, they were Contract Bridge partners who, later in life, would attain National Master status.

I offer this background to illustrate that these two, who were very different, were really smart cookies.

Dinner at our house was an experience. We were not very well off financially, but we ate well. We lived on an island in the Florida Kevs where seafood was abundant and cheaper than beef.

But as much as the lobster, stone crab, and yellowtail snapper, I remember the conversations at the dinner table.

When Dad would make a statement about politics, Mom would take the opposite view. And off they went. To say that their conversation was engaging would be an understatement. Oftentimes, there was no winner declared.

What I most remember about those conversations were not the points in contention, but that when it came time to clear the table, neither of them was angry with the other.

I've written many times before about civility, respect, and tolerance and how important it is to have conversations and not confrontations with others of differing opinions.

However somehow, at this most precarious point in time, many of us have become so entrenched in our positions that we don't want to hear anything to the contrary. As a result. we avoid discussing the issues that are so important to the

future of our country.

We build walls around our opinions to avoid contrasting facts and we only enter those places that echo our own beliefs. Are we too stubborn to concede to different ideas, or too lazy to reconsider what we think we already know?

Albert Einstein said, "It takes a touch of genius - and a lot of courage - to move in the opposite direction."

But that's what we need to do. We surely are not getting any place fast on the path we're on.

So how do we get there? First, we have to quit insulting each other when we disagree. While we may view other opinions as uninformed, illogical, or just plain stupid, embracing that position only deepens the divide among us.

Second, we need to seek the common ground that unites us. Places where we do agree, and then proceed from there. Think about it, we have so much in common. Dismissing one another ignores an undisputable truth: We desperately need each other to survive on our little planet.

And finally, we need to make space to laugh with each other. To celebrate the successes of humanity and share our intrinsic kindness and compassion with others.

I know this may sound simplistic, but it's certainly a start, and a much better place

than where we are right now.

Environmental Conservation & Sustainability Committee (ECSC)

School is in session and pools are closing, but it is still hot! Autumn officially begins on September 22nd. In recent years, fall's cool weather takes longer to arrive. What can we do?

You've heard it all before: Insulate your home to spend less on heating and cooling. Consolidate your errands to drive less. Buy energy-efficient equipment (with rebates!) when updating major appliances. Support climate initiatives. And remember: refuse, reduce, and reuse before you recycle.

However, to recycle all the items you can, plan to attend the next Special Recycling Event on October 26 from 9 -1, next to Shallowford Square. ECSC volunteers will be there to take and sort your special recyclables. so you won't even have to get out of your car. Hopefully, you've been saving items since June, when the newest Recycling Poster arrived in the Citizen. If not, start now! From the Desk of Jon Hanna What's (Not) Good for the Goose...

As you've passed by or through Jack Warren Park lately, you've probably noticed things are a little wilder in places than they used to be. While you may be tempted to think the Town has violated its own unkept yard policy, this is actually part of our Canada Goose management plan. When the land associated with the Mary Alice Warren Community Center transitioned from row crops and trees to routinely moved open space it became a magnet for the geese, and with geese comes goose poop. In order to keep this unsanitary substance off everyone's shoes

and children, we needed a plan to encourage the birds to return to whichever golf course they came from. Town Council required that we not be lethal, and they urged that we look for creative solutions. In the end, staff came up with a multi-dimensional approach that first dealt with how we were managing the land. Neatly mowed. open turf areas like the fields around the building were attractive as safe landing and feeding spots. Geese don't want to land or walk in vegetation they can't see through and they love to eat fresh grass. By simply changing our

mowing practices on those large areas, we dramatically cut back on preferred habitat for them, while simultaneously creating habitat for songbirds and pollinators. In the spaces where we couldn't change our mowing practices, like the building lawn and the sports field, we have used liquid and granular repellents that are safe for people but make the grass taste bad to the geese. In addition, we've planted groups of native ornamental grasses to eventually create visual and physical barriers around the parking lots. So far, the geese are cooperating. Sorry golfers.

Bulky Item Pick-Up

Acceptable Items: Household furniture, lawn furniture, vacuum cleaners, carpet, extra large rugs, bicycles, toilets, grills (no propane), mattresses, and box springs (limit of 2 sets per household).

Acceptable White Goods: Stoves, refrigerators, freezers

(doors must be removed), water heaters, and dishwashers.

Reminder: Items must be placed within three feet of the curb and cannot be bagged or boxed.

Prohibited Items: Televisions, computers, mirrors or glass of any kind, household waste, yard waste, dead animals, tires, hazardous waste, chemicals, paint, microwaves, electronic waste, car motors, clothing, shoes, books, general recycle items, liquid waste, batteries, motor oil and any equipment containing oil or gas, lumber scraps, construction debris, bagged trash, cardboard, and cardboard boxes.

Residents can also dispose of these items at the Hanes Mill Road Landfill. For more information about this landfill, please call 336-727-8000 or visit citvofws.org/1259/Landfill-Information.

This class has limited spots and the first 25 signups receive priority registration. Anyone interested in the class should email their name, age, and phone number to


