Cliff Lewis Receives Town Award

From the Firehouse Employee Spotlight: Omar Chavez

Omar Chavez joined the Vienna Fire Department in 2022, arriving with a full slate of certifications, EMT credentials, and a strong recommendation from the Advance Fire Department. He joined the department's fast-track orientation and quickly became a vital part of the team.

"Omar is a great asset to our training staff and cadet firefighters," Vienna Chief Tim Lasley said. "Medical, rescue, and fires, you can count on Omar."

Chavez moved to North Carolina in 2016 and joined the Advance Fire Department that year. He completed multiple EMT and firefighter certifications; all while working at a full-time job and part-time with the fire department.

Chavez's commitment has not gone unnoticed. He was honored as the Vienna Fire Department's Firefighter of the Year and Rescue Member of the Year in 2024, and received the Firefighter of the Year award again in 2025.

"We are proud to have Omar and his family in our family," Chief Lasley said.

In North Carolina, the Sunshine List is a list of individuals and organizations that have requested to receive notice of public meetings and public hearings from public bodies. This list is commonly referred to as the "Sunshine List". Public bodies are required to provide notice of meeting and public hearing to anyone who requests the information. This allows residents to stay informed about the operations of local government and to participate in the democratic process.

The Lewisville Public Art Advisory Committee is hosting the Arts Alive in Lewisville art exhibit in early 2026!



Are You Recycling or Wish-cycling?

I tend to be obsessive about recycling, which I'm sure gets on the nerves of my coworkers and family. It turns out, though, that many of you are, too. In Lewisville last year we had 95% participation in curbside recycling with a respectable 8.19% contamination rate. Those are great numbers, y'all!

While I'm really proud of Lewisville, I'm going to challenge some of you to get better about "wish-cycling". That is putting something in the recycling bin that theoretically is recyclable, but is not on the list of Waste Management (WM) approved materials.

In the case of the plastic play slide in the photo below, it's never even going to make it into the truck. Neither will the box, even though it is perfectly acceptable if it is broken down and flattened. In the case of the bagged material, it will literally get kicked out by the machines at the sorting facility and make its way to the landfill as trash. We've toured the Material Recovery Facility (MRF) and watched this happen in person. Please – empty the bags into the bin and save your specialty items for our special recycling events. Next up is holiday cardboard (please don't put trash in the bins) and







E-Cycling (held at the Public Works building this year).

Also, our part-ners at WM have added plastic and paper to-go cups to the list, so don't throw those away after your trip to one of Lewisville's great coffee shops!

Generative A.I. and the Town

We've seen Generative Artificial Intelligence* (Gen A.I.) completely change how we communicate in online spaces over the past year, and it has been a bit, well, scary. The images and videos we scroll past every day are becoming more realistic but less real.

It was humbling to realize that I, personally, could no longer tell what was Gen A.I. It's just that good. I found myself second-guessing every video, photo, and caption I saw. It felt exhausting. But after I panicked for the appropriate amount of time, I realized we'll still be okay. There has always been false information on the internet (surprise); this is just a new kind.

As far as the content we're posting and publishing from the Town of Lewisville, we're keeping it real. Not as in 'look at us, we're better than Gen A.I.,' but in that there's enough to worry about, why add to the confusion? Real people will write our articles, and a real camera will take our photos.

Now, that doesn't mean we're falling behind at the Town. I'm doing my part as a communications specialist to be informed

about new technology and stay in touch with others in the communications field to keep your local government information up to date. I'm involved as a member of the North Carolina City and County Communications Association, and regularly attend seminars that affect public information, such as N.C. emergency management and National Weather Service education. The important part of this position is keeping our residents informed and doing so openly and transparently. Right now, that means that the most A.I. we're using is spell-check.

I ask that you please protect yourself when using the internet. When you see something, anything, check the source. Be aware of who is making that post or writing that story, and find out if they're credible.

How we communicate has always been ever-changing and growing. The Town of Lewisville will continue to adapt to those changes. *I* will continue to adapt with you. The reason I'm in this job is to be a public servant and help care for our residents. That's exactly what I plan to do.

*Artificial Intelligence is a broad field of computer learning. Generative Artificial Intelligence is a specific type of A.I. that pulls from existing data to create new content, such as text and images.
