Bulky Item Pickup Begins October 12

Lewisville's fall Bulky Item Pickup collection will begin **Monday, October 12**. Lewisville residents wishing to participate in the pickup should have all acceptable bulky items curbside by **6 a.m.** that day.

Waste Management will only make ONE PASS through Town to collect these items. The entire process will take approximately two weeks, but items need to be placed by October 13, as we do not have their pickup route.

Bulky Item Pickup collections are held twice a year and provide Lewisville residents with an easy and convenient way to dispose of unwanted items that are

too large to fit within a trash bin and would otherwise be taken to the landfill.

Acceptable items include household and lawn furniture, carpet, extra large rugs, bicycles, toilets, grills (no propane), mattresses (limit 2 box springs per household), stoves, refrigerators, water heaters, and dishwashers.

Prohibited items include televisions, mirrors, any glass, yard waste, chemicals, paint, batteries, equipment with oil or gas, and cardboard boxes.

From Your Mayor **I am Proof that Public Schools Matter**

As someone raised by a single parent, I know firsthand the important role public education can play in a child's life. Winston-Salem/Forsyth County Schools provided me with opportunities, support, and guidance that helped shape the person I am today despite the odds that I faced.

From my first days at Konnoak Elementary to my graduation from R.J. Reynolds High School, I benefited from many of the services public schools provide every day. Reliable transportation ensured I could get to school from Stockton Street in Winston-Salem. Access to quality textbooks and educational resources helped me learn, grow, and prepare for the future.

Free and reduced-price meal programs also made a meaningful difference. Like many students, I relied on those meals to help meet basic needs and stay focused in the classroom.

Equally important were the relationships I built throughout my years in school. Several male teachers served as positive role models during critical stages of my development. Their guidance, encouragement, and belief in my potential left a lasting impression and helped me understand the importance of responsibility and character.

Beyond the classroom, after-school programs provided a safe and productive environment during the hours when many young people are most vulnerable to destructive influences. Those programs gave me opportunities to learn, build relationships, and develop skills that helped me avoid poor choices in a world that I was getting ready to face.

Because public education had such a profound

impact on my own journey, I believe education should be viewed as a statewide priority that deserves thoughtful attention and investment. The challenges facing public schools today are not unique to WS/FCS or any single district. Across North Carolina, public school systems continue to face funding pressures that affect their ability to meet growing needs.

The effects of long-term funding challenges can be significant. Public schools are struggling to attract and retain highly qualified teachers, maintain competitive salaries, update instructional materials, and provide critical student support services. These issues affect students in urban, suburban, and rural communities alike.

For many children, public schools are more than places of learning. They are places where students find mentors, support systems, and opportunities that may not exist anywhere else in their lives.

The temporary shortcomings of our local school system should not be a distraction that North Carolina remains near the bottom in education funding. While discussions often focus on challenges, it's important to recognize the tremendous impact that public education has had on countless lives, including my own.

From the Desk of Jon Hanna

A Burn with Benefits at Jack Warren Park

Unless you were one of the lucky few driving by at just the right moment last February, you probably didn't get to see the meadow at the entrance to Jack Warren Park burst into flames. It was intentional, of course, and expertly managed by members of the Lewisville Fire Department and trainees from the Fire Academy at Forsyth Tech. This group of young firefighters-in-training was in Lewisville as part of the Fire Control module of their six-month course. Controlling fire begins with an understanding of its characteristics in all materials and locations, and as their instructor Captain Marty Bowen of the LFD said, "this field gives them a unique opportunity to actually experience fire behavior in a live setting, as they may actually see it." A seasoned wildland firefighter himself, Captain Bowen stresses that the Wildland-Urban Interface is becoming a bigger part of many fire departments' routine territory and experience with wildfire is critical. Personally, I was proud for Lewisville to host and contribute to such a young and diverse group of future public servants.

In addition to a teaching tool, the fire on this small patch of town ground is also a land management tool. In 2023, we decided to let this previously neatly mowed, former crop field grow a little wild in order to deter Canada Geese from feeding there and subsequently depositing their waste at the new community center. As the field grew and native plants reappeared, the site became a bonus habitat for local insect pollinators, birds, and other wildlife. We've since seeded some native grasses and beneficial perennials, but nothing has transformed the plot like fire. Native grasslands, since the beginning of time, have regularly burned and depend on it for regeneration. After only two years, it is fascinating to see the transformation in progress as native species use their ancient relationship with fire to outcompete weedy invaders. Cast a glance as you drive by this fall and a show of wild Asters will be quietly thanking those brave, young firefighters. Walk through on one of the trails we've mowed and a whole bunch of happy little pollinators may echo the sentiment.

Don't Fall for the Call

When it comes to phone scams, it's important to be aware and protect yourself from scammers. Here are tips from Lewisville Community Policing's Sergeant Preston Stringer to help you recognize phone scams and how to report scams and fraud.

Recognizing Phone Scams

Scammers will impersonate all levels of law enforcement and other businesses or government organizations.

Scammers can use the real names of law enforcement officers from public records/web-sites.

Scams often include missing jury duty, failing to pay a fine from a ticket/accident, and more.

Scammers will ask for cash, gift cards, and money apps (Venmo, Cash App, Zelle, Paypal, etc.) These methods of exchanges are harder to trace.

What Should You Do

HANG UP! If you think someone is trying to scam you over the phone, hang up. Scammers try to use urgency and threats of legal action to scare you, but if you're suspicious of a potential scam, verify with the Sheriff's Office.

Fire Prevention Week

Each year, the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) sponsors Fire Prevention Week. This year, that week is October 4-10, and the topic is **"Charge into Fire Safety; Safe Charging is a Superpower!"** This is the second year in a row that NFPA has selected Lithium-Ion battery awareness as its theme. The reason is that recharging batteries with this technology has caused fires when done improperly, and the word needs to get out to as many people as possible.

One of the critical issues that we face with Lithium-Ion batteries is that some people don't understand what needs to be done to dispose of used batteries. Oftentimes, folks have disposed of these batteries in either the trash or recycling cans, which is very dangerous. They can only be "recycled" at approved locations - of which there are none in Lewisville. There have been cases locally where Waste Management trucks have caught fire due to a Lithium-ion battery being traumatized in a load that has been picked up, which then involves us.

Important Tips for Charging Superpowers:

- Cheap charger? Don't use it. Use the cord that came with your device or one approved by the manufacturer.
- Soft surface? Hard pass. Charge on a hard, flat surface like a table.
- Fully charged? Time to unplug. Unplug devices when fully charged.
- Feels hot? Stop using it. Don't use devices that feel hot.

Fall begins officially on September 22, so you know the Fall **Special Recycling Event** cannot be far behind! Mark your calendars for October 17 from 10 am to 2 pm and bring your saved recyclables to the MAW-CC drive-thru drop-off. Our volunteers will be ready to accept your items. Please check the Town's website for changes to the Terracycle collections. LewisvilleNC.net/SpecialRecycling.

There are some who say that recycling is a waste of effort...that very little actually gets recycled and instead ends up in landfills or the ocean. That may be true for some, but not in our wonderful Town of Lewisville. Your bi-weekly curbside recycling goes to Waste Management facili-

ties where sorting, packing and shipping occur. The items that the ECSC collects at Special Events are delivered by volunteers to businesses that accept plastic film, bubble wrap, and batteries. The famously weird items you bring for Terracycle are packed and shipped separately to be recycled into new products like outdoor furniture and storage bins.

Across the Yadkin River is Unifi, a company that takes plastic drink bottles and turns them into REPREVE, thread used for carpets and clothes. Aluminum cans currently sell for \$.45 - \$.70 per pound. Made primarily into new beverage cans, they can also become auto parts or building materials. Your alumi-

num gutters could be made of recycled cans!

So please, continue closing the loop. Buy recycled products and then recycle them with the Town when you are done. Our Town and our planet thank you!
