Each day was an adventure. And while most of our families didn't have a lot of money, our lives were rich with the things that mattered. Things like friendships built through extraordinary experiences, a caring for our community and our neighbors, and respect for our differences. It was a magical place.

But like with most magical places, many others wanted to come to our island paradise to share the experience, build their lives, and raise their families. Who could blame them?

When I left the island for college in 1971, I knew that my island home was going to change and never again be the place that, in my mind, was the best place on earth.

I know that so many of you who have grown up over the years in our little community of Lewisville have experienced the same kind of change. Farmland cleared for development, more traffic on our roads, and a lot of new faces that we've warmly welcomed.

Life moves on, and as much as we all would like our community to stay the way it was and is, things change. All we can do is try to do our best to manage that change. 




January CPR Class

HOME Rehabilitation Program

The cost of home improvement and maintenance often presents a significant barrier to homeowners, especially those with fixed or moderate incomes. The Forsyth County Housing Rehabilitation Program seeks to use State and Federal funding to provide a variety of housing repairs for qualifying Forsyth County homeowners to ensure they have safe, stable, and suitable housing. These repairs can include roof repair and replacement, lead paint and asbestos remediation, septic system replacement, well replacement. HVAC repair and replacement, plumbing and electrical upgrades, accessibility modifications, and other general improvements.

To be eligible for HOME, you must be a homeowner and full-time resident of Forsyth County, current on your mortgage payments and property taxes, with a low-to-moderate income. If you meet these requirements and the house you own and live in needs serious repairs, you may qualify for Forsyth County's Housing Rehabilitation Program. Safe housing should be attainable for all, regardless of their income level.

Can't Spell WATER without "WE"

It may seem peculiar to publish a stormwater column here as we head into winter, but it's actually a very timely subject. This time of year, there are several common practices that lead to stream pollution or drainage malfunctions, but together we can keep our water clean and flowing.

Stormwater is important because we're working with a shared resource. The "we" in water suggests a public interest and a common responsibility. Water running down any town storm drain makes its way through our local creeks and into the Yadkin River. That river supplies drinking water to nearly a million Carolinians. We all expect our state's waters to be drinkable, fishable, and swimmable and it is far more economical to keep water clean than it is to purify contaminated water.

It seems counterintuitive, but what's good for our grass is not good for our water. Nutrients from fertilizers wreak havoc in our Yadkin River basin from Bashavia Creek to Winyah Bay and represent some of the most problematic, yet preventable, water quality issues we face. The same can be said for pet waste, which contaminates drinking water and swimming holes alike. Cleaning up after our dogs doesn't seem like a big deal, but it's a simple way to have a big impact.

As the leaves come down, we also have to remember we need to keep them clear of ditches and drains. Our stormwater conveyances act just like gutters on a house. We have to keep them clean and functioning properly or all kinds of bad things can happen. We must all take part in keeping Lewisville's waters clean and flowing.

UDO Update Project

Dating all the way back to September 7, 1995, the Town of Lewisville adopted its first United Development Ordinance (UDO). The UDO is a book of ordinances that is made up of laws that govern land use including residential and non-residential zoning regulations, environmental regulations, and subdivision regulations. Since that September date in 1995, the UDO has undergone many changes, shaping language to become a customized book of development rules specific to the Town of Lewisville.

Fast forward to April 14, 2022, the Lewisville Town Council adopted the Lewisville Tomorrow Comprehensive Plan. This plan establishes a foundation for the future as it was built upon previous efforts, including the Town's previously adopted comprehensive plans. Lewisville Tomorrow helps inform decisions, allowing Lewisville to continue embracing its small-town character.

Now it is time to package the hard work of all those who have had an impact on the Town. The Town has teamed up with Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. to modernize the UDO. Our goal is to better integrate the UDO into a more streamlined document that is concise, user-friendly, compliant with general statutes, consistent with best practices and provides the town an opportunity to improve existing procedures.


