

Solar Energy at the Mary Alice Warren Community Center

The Town of Lewisville took significant steps toward achieving its 2030 sustainability goals in April with the installation of a 51kW solar energy array at the Mary Alice Warren Community Center. The 108 solar panels installed on the rear roof of the

center will provide approximately 96% of the building's energy usage and offset an estimated 1.4 million pounds of carbon emissions over the next three decades.

The cost of the \$122,000 system will be offset with approximately \$70,000 in federal tax credits and rebates from Duke Energy. During the next 30 years, the system is projected to save the town \$225,000 in electricity bills.

"The town council has adopted some very aggressive sustainability goals

Especially thanks to those of you who brought items to the Special Recycling event! Every item repurposed or recycled reduces trash. Keep saving for Terracycle and be ready for our next Special Recycling – the last Saturday in October.

And remember, these ECSC events are not the only way to

recycle. On any trip to the grocery store you can put plastic bags and film into the appropriate bin out front. As long as they're marked with a 2 or 4 in a triangle or have the "store drop-off" label, they're recyclable. Bags that aren't can be reused for refrigerating fruits or leftovers instead of buying new plastic. Glass jars can be reused in the same way. Different groceries collect different items. Check your favorite store's bins, because some recycle egg cartons or the #1 – 5 non-small neck plastics you bring to our events. That's where

we take what we collect. By making weekly drop-offs a habit, you'll have less clutter in your home while doing environmental good.

As the weather warms, enjoy the outdoors while preparing for the coming heat of summer. Check the weather stripping on all of your doors and windows. We hope the LED bulb you took home from Lewisville Earth Day is brightening your world while using less energy.

From the Desk of JON HANNA - PUBLIC WORKS


As new Public Works Director, I've had the opportunity over the last couple months to learn a lot and get to know a bunch of great people. Lewisville is vibrant with exciting new projects and expertly guided by a hardworking staff. I consider myself extremely fortunate to be here working with them and for you.

I hope to make this column a regular addition to the newsletter as it will allow me to update you on what the Public Works Department is up to, what may be coming as far as new projects are concerned, and generally keep you informed of the thinking or planning behind some of the things you see going on around town. I'll also try to provide helpful tips or point out improvements we could make regarding how we manage our shared spaces and resources.

For example, this is the time of year many of us are applying fertilizers and pre-emergents to the lawn. *Please* make sure this material is thoroughly cleaned up from the storm sewers and all paved surfaces. As counterintuitive as it seems, fertilizer is a major pollutant once it hits our waterways. The same goes for leaves and grass clippings. They're unsightly in the streets and along the curbs, but more importantly, these become pollutants once they leave the site in stormwater. In my opinion, a homeowner's best friend is a good mulching mower. Close the deck, keep the blades sharp, and mulch it all in – leaves, grass, garden gnomes – all of it. If it's returned to the soil, it doesn't become a waste product to be disposed of.

Also, you may notice some areas of Jack Warren Park that aren't being mowed as often as they have before. These sites are pieces of our larger mitigation plan for Canada Geese. In the last couple years, the geese have created a sanitation problem in several areas, especially around the new community center. By allowing the large, open fields to grow a little higher, we hope to offer less attractive feeding sites and therefore reduce the numbers of landing geese.
