# *From Your Mayor* **The Drive Home**

**M**y first job growing up was as a bellhop on the weekends at the Howard Johnson Motor Lodge on our little island in the Florida Keys. It was 1967 and I was 14. I wore the signature HoJo orange vest and, if I remember correctly, made \$1.25 an hour, minimum wage at the time.

My shift was from 4 p.m. to 11 p.m. and, while I had my driver's learning permit, I couldn't drive after sunset. So, one of my parents, usually my mom, had to drive me to work and pick me up. When I turned 16, I got my regular driver's license and was able to drive myself in my first car, a 1960 Ford Thunderbird - bucket seats, vinyl roof, tail fins and a 350 HP V8.

But I digress.

As I have mentioned in prior columns, there weren't many people on our island at that time. There were no streetlights or stoplights. My drive home from work on U.S. 1 was 15 minutes and if I met two other cars on the way, that would be surprising. What was unusual, however, was when I left work at 11 p.m. there almost always was a car that followed me, not too close, until I turned onto my street.

I really didn't think too much about it. I was 16 and most, if not all, of my brainpower, went to thinking about girls.

One evening though it did occur to me to mention this to my dad. He was a big man of few words and his

response to me was, "Don't worry, that's Curt."

Curt, aka Sheriff's Deputy Curt Mathis, was one of four deputies on our island. So, while my dad would never admit he was worried about me driving at night, he and Curt conspired to make sure I got home safe. That's how it was on our island.

I share this story, albeit a little too long, because Lewisville is a lot like my island. Our six community policing deputies, led by Sergeant P.J. Stringer, are a lot like Curt Mathis. They do more than just patrolling our streets. They spend time in our neighborhoods, get to know us and our kids, are always ready to help if needed and, when necessary, will never hesitate to put themselves between us and danger.

So, the next time you see one of "our finest" in a restaurant, at one of our events or patrolling our town, give them a wink and a wave of thanks. Because it's what they do every day to help make sure all of us get home and stay safe. That's how it is in our little town.

## E-Cycling Day Set for September 8 in Shallowford Square

Waste Management will host an upcoming E-Cycling Day for residents of the Town of Lewisville. The special electronics recycling event will be held from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. on Saturday, September 8 at Shallowford Square.

According to Waste Management's website, "most electronics contain heavy metals that can be harmful to human health and the environment. With technology rapidly evolving in our increasingly digital age, outdated electronic devices are thrown away at an accelerating pace. Used electronics now account for 70 percent of the toxic waste found in

landfills."

Every day in the United States, approximately 130,000 computers are discarded. Peripherals can also be recycled. These include keyboards, cables, mice, computer speakers, printers, scanners, floppy drives, optical media and external hard drives. Every year, Americans buy more than 100 million cell phones, yet fewer than 20 percent of old cell phones are recycled. Discarded phones represent about 65,000 tons of electronic garbage every year. Simply by recycling the phones, customers could save enough energy to power more than

194,000 homes for an entire year. Cell phones are made from copper, other valuable metals, and plastics - all of which require energy to extract and manufacture. Recycling cell phones helps recover these valuable resources and saves energy. Recycling just a million cell phones reduces greenhouse gas emissions equal to removing 1,368 cars off the road for a full year.

This e-cycling event is a great opportunity to dispose of these type of items. This event is free for the residents of Lewisville. Please bring your electronic devices ready for discarding during this day.
