James Ayers was selected unanimously by the Lewisville Town Council to serve as the next Town Manager. He started his new position on November 1, 2022. Ayers has served in the public sector since 2008, including roles as Town Manager (Manteo, NC), Assistant Town Manager and Director of Engineering & Public Works (Bluffton, SC), and Department Director (Foothills Regional

Commission and City of Asheville, NC). Prior to that, Ayers worked in private industry, including more than

15 years in real estate development and construction project management.

Ayers earned a Bachelor of Science degree from Vanderbilt University, with a double major in engineering science and economics. He also has a Master of Science degree in administration from Central Michigan University. Ayers is a graduate of the Municipal & County Administration program and the Public Executive Leadership Academy at the School of Government at UNC-Chapel Hill, the Senior Executive Institute at the University of Virginia, and the International City/ County Management Association's Leadership ICMA program. Ayers also holds the designation as an ICMA Credentialed Manager (ICMA-CM) from the International City/County Management Association.

You are encouraged to follow pollinator friendly practices as well! Eliminate the use of chemicals, plant pollinator friendly annuals and perennials, reduce the frequency of mowing your lawn and... maybe even mix some low-growing clover seed in with your grass seed next Spring!

from PAGE 1 noted the need for a more expansive committee. Once obtaining further direction from Town Council. a draft ordinance to establish a Public Art Advisory Committee (PAAC) as a standalone committee was developed by staff and approved by the Town Council in November 2022.

The ordinance includes an application to place artwork on Town property; policies and procedures for art donations. loans. and exhibitions on public property; and a PAAC

application.

The mission of the PAAC is to suggest and recommend actions pertaining to the acquisition, loan, placement, maintenance, display, and/or disposal of the Town's public artworks. The PAAC shall consult with and advise Town staff and Council in matters affecting public art policies, resources, and acquisitions related to the total Town public arts program.

The definition of public art is: a. Photography, paintings, sculptures, murals, pottery, ceramics, tapestry, fabric and other media.

b. Visually and physically accessible to community

c. Indoor or outdoor

Each session will run 2 to 3 hours and all supplies will be provided.

### 40+ Stage Company

Two programs will be offered in 2023: one will provide an introduction to the basic skills required to audition successfully for an acting role in community theater. The course will consist of six two-hour sessions presented weekly during which participants will be asked to prepare readings of monologues from well-known plays for presentation to the class.

The second, the *Your Best Shot* seminar, is a workshop designed to help students hone their skills on stage, at the podium, in the conference room, or any time in front of a group. Participants will explore the psychology and physiology of creating and sustaining an energetic presence in performance. Class work will include exercises, group discussion, individual dramatic readings, and ensemble work. Some previous on stage or public speaking experience is preferable.

## Environmental Conservation & Sustainability Committee News Save the Date for Lewisville Earth Day: April 29

We welcome 2023 by thanking those of you who took advantage of the recycling opportunities the Town offered in 2022. Get ready for more! Although winter just arrived, we're asking you to flip those new calendars to spring and save April 29, 2023 for the first Lewisville Earth Day (LED) celebration. The LED, a convenient reminder to use LED bulbs to conserve energy, will coincide with our Special Recycling event on David McKee Street (adjacent to Shallowford Square). You'll be able to bring us non-curbside recyclables and TerraCycle items as part of the ECSC event, visit various environmental vendors with Earth Day knowledge, and pick up a free LED lightbulb. There will be snow cones and music, too! More details will be in the March/ April newsletter, but for now, mark your calendars and continue saving those special recycling items! Not sure what to save? Search for "recycling guidelines" on the Town's website.

The ECSC asks our residents to continue the good work you're doing with bi-weekly curbside pickup.

Remember that clean #5 tubs (such as sour cream and vogurt tubs) are now accepted curbside! According to a Waste Management Recycling Tonnage Report, approximately 92% of what's collected in Lewisville is able to be recycled. This means that ~8% cannot be recycled due to contamination. One way for our community to decrease contamination is to ensure the following such items are NOT in the recycle bin: peanut butter, mayo, and cooking oil containers or greasy pizza box bottoms. These items contaminate the stream and make it impossible to recycle the good stuff. Check the Town's website (lewisvillenc.net) under Public Works/ Solid Waste and Recycling if you're not sure. Waste Management, the Town's collector, has four videos on this site, including one about contamination. It's under two minutes long, and worth your time.

Remember to put your real trees out by January 9, and thanks!
