In addition, Town Hall will be closed Tuesday, January 1 in observance of New Year's Day.

Waste Management will also be closed Tuesday, January 1. Trash pickup will be delayed one day beginning Tuesday, January 1 through Friday, January 4.

Special Recycling Event Set for November 3

The Lewisville Reycling Committee (LRC) will host a special recycle collection event from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. for Saturday, November 3 at Shallowford Square on David McKee Street.

LRC collects clean items not included in the bi-weekly recycling. Go to the Town of Lewisville website https://www.lewisvillenc.net/solid-waste-recycling to find the list of accepted and unaccepted items. This event offers the residents a proper way to recycle items not permitted in the regular curbside recycle collection.

Town Office Manager Stacy Howard said the special recycling events are vital to assist the residents in properly disposing of materials.

"People often call Town Hall inquiring about recycle procedures

for styrofoam peanuts and bubble wrap as well as other items that are not accepted curbside."



Howard said. "This recycling event offers the opportunity for these items to be properly recycled."

RECYCLING ITEMS ACCEPTED WILL INCLUDE:

Plastic and paper grocery bags, styrofoam peanuts and bubble wrap, styrofoam egg cartons, inkjet and laser cartridges, cell phones, plastic six-pack rings, household batteries (only NiCad, mercury, lead and lithium), residential florescent bulbs, empty propane tanks, corks, #1 non-

small neck plastic containers like cool whip tubs and lids, #5 plastic food containers (like yogurt), and automobile batteries.

ITEMS UNACCEPTABLE WILL INCLUDE:

No items that are already permitted in the curbside recycling program such as cardboard and newspaper, no used motor oil, latex paint or antifreeze. All chemicals, paints, televisions and hazardous waste must be taken to the 3RC Envirostation in Winston-Salem, no glass or other plastics not accepted curbside, no toys, housewares or small appliances.

Clean used toys, housewares and other small working appliances should be taken to the Goodwill site at the Oaks Shopping Center.

Christmas Holiday Recycling Events announced

Holiday Cardboard Recycling Collection

The Recycling Committee will once again be sponsoring the Holiday Cardboard Recycling Collection.

This year's collection will run from Monday, December 24 through Tuesday, January 2, 2019 in the Lewisville Elementary School Parking lot. This Recycling Event is for cardboard/chip board, such as gift boxes, shipping boxes or packaging from toys.



The bin will be emptied on a regular basis so that additional items can be recycled. If the bin is full and your items will not fit, please do not leave items in the parking lot or surrounding the bin.

Lewisville Elementary School allows the Recycling Committee to use the parking lot for this event as a service to Town residents, so please be mindful of this when recycling items.

Christmas Tree Removal

Another important holiday collection is this year's Christmas tree removal, which will begin on Monday, Jan. 7, 2019.

Trees must be at the curbside by 6 a.m. on that day to ensure pick up, and there will be only one pass through town to collect trees.

Please put this date on your calendar so that your tree will not be missed.



Winter Bulky Item Pickup Scheduled for January 14

The next Bulky Item Pickup event will be held Monday, January 14. Those residents wishing to participate in the pickup should have all acceptable bulky items curbside by 7 a.m.

Bulky item collection events are held a few times per year and

provide Lewisville residents an easy and convenient way to dispose of unwanted, large items that would otherwise need to be taken to the landfill. Town Hall has received recent calls about the event, so Town staff is anticipating high participation from Lewisville residents.

As an added attraction this year, LCC has partnered with IFB Solutions, known previously as "Industries for the Blind" to bring a unique event to the Town of Lewisville. This year, prior to the Christmas Parade, a Santa Showdown: Reindeer vs. Elves 2.5 Fun Run will be held. The race will begin at 2:45 p.m. and conclude with the last participant crossing the finish line.

After the conclusion of the race, the Christmas parade will begin with an estimated start time of 3:15 p.m.

Roads into Lewisville will be closed to traffic at 2:30 p.m. until the conclusion of the parade at the

discretion of law enforcement.

The parade point of origin is at the intersection of Shallowford and Lewisville Vienna roads. The parade then turns at the Oaks Shopping Center on Williams Road, turns again on Belnette and ends at Shallowford Square.

The staging of parade participants depends on the type of entry and can be found in the rules and regulations listed on the LCC website. Signs, safety cones and barricades will be placed the day before the event to inform residents of road closures and delays.

Piedmont Authority for Regional Transportation (PART) has secured funding to enhance bus service into Winston-Salem to reduce congestion during the Business 40 Closure. PART will increase service on Route 6 Surry County Express, Route 17 Kernersville/WS Express, adjust Route 18, and create a new Route 28 West Forsyth Express. These services began October 29. Thanks to Business 40 Mitigation funding, PART is adding a route from Clemmons and Lewisville into Winston-Salem. The schedule provides peak hours and mid-day service to provide a connection from Western Forsyth County. Davie Medical Center was temporarily removed from this schedule until an agreement with Baptist Hospital is finalized for the Park & Ride Lot.

Reminder: Help Keep Storm Drains Clean


Please do not blow or rake any leaves or lawn clippings over the curb to ensure storm drains remain clear!

understanding ROUNDABOUTS



WHAT IS A ROUNDABOUT?

A roundabout is an intersection requiring entering traffic to yield the right of way to traffic already in the roundabout. This keeps the traffic in the roundabout flowing and prevents traffic backups and delays.

WHY INSTALL A ROUNDABOUT?

Roundabouts help address safety and congestion concerns at intersections. They are designed to enhance traffic efficiency, safety and aesthetics and minimize delay and cost for all users including motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists.



HOW TO DRIVE A ROUNDABOUT:

- Yield to vehicles already in the roundabout;
- Once in the roundabout, you have the right of way;
- Use your turn signal when exiting the roundabout
- Always be cautious and look for unexpected vehicles, pedestrians or bicycles.


