Independence Day Celebration

Plans are underway for the Town of Lewisville's annual Independence Day celebration. The festivities will take place on Tuesday, July 4 in Shallowford Square.

The Extraordinaires band will take center stage at the pavilion beginning at 6:00 p.m. Fireworks will begin at dark. Concessions will be available for purchase.

"This is always a popular event in the Town", said Town Manager, Hank Perkins.

"People travel from near and far to partake in one of the best fireworks displays in the county. Although we receive thousands of spectators for this event each year, the Forsyth County Sheriff's department has always done an excellent job assisting with traffic control to insure that safety is always first and traffic is directed out of the area as quickly as possible." Perkins added.

"This is an event that requires a lot of time and effort thus we begin planning in January. Our residents enjoy getting to see

Making the Trains Run on Time

History cites Italy's fascist dictator, Benito Mussolini, during his ascendancy to power in the 1920s as gaining the support of the Italian people by making the trains run on time. While there is disagreement among historians as to the validity of this claim, it does provide a great introduction into my topic for this issue of the Lewisville Citizen.

So who makes the trains run on time in Lewisville? Or to rephrase the question, who keeps the roads paved, the potholes filled, the garbage and recycling collected, the storm drains clean and the parks maintained? Who coordinates events, protects your property values, manages our growth and plans for our community's future?

These responsibilities fall to our Town's staff who, working with the Town Council and our committees, come to work every day committed to keeping Lewisville a great place to live. I'd like to share a little about them with you.

Hank Perkins has been our town manager for almost five years. He came to us from North Wilkesboro. He not only has the responsibility for managing our staff, but he also has to be responsive to our council, our committees and our residents – not an easy job – but one performed well. Hank is married and has a son and twin daughters. In his spare time, he backpacks the Appalachian Trail, lacking just around 500 miles left to complete the 2,200-mile trek from Georgia to Maine.

grandmother of Noel, who we have watched with pride as she has grown into an outstanding young woman. Joyce is married to the very patient Clint Walker, who borders on sainthood. They have a son and daughter.

George Hauser is our public works director and has been with the town for 16 years. His expertise spans a multitude of diverse areas from fixing potholes to keeping our computer network up and running. George manages most of our outside contracts including road paving, snow removal and solid waste and recycling collection. David Matthews has been with our town for 13 years. As a maintenance technician in the public works department David is on our front line making sure our facilities stay in tip-top condition. New website features convenient tools for residents

On the Town's new website, residents can find information on the Lewisville Town Council and other boards and committees, updates on current and upcoming planning projects, meeting schedules, facilities rental information, important news updates, Town documents, as well as applications that many residents might find useful.

How Do I?

One of the many new features of the website is the "How Do I?" tab, located on the website's main menu. Here residents can find the answer to many common questions, such as "How do I apply for a landfill voucher?" or "How do I request a facility rental?" or "How do I stay connected?" along with many others.

Report a Problem

Residents can also use the new "Report a Problem" application-also accessible through the "How do I?...Request problems to be fixed"- to report various types of issues including missed waste management pickup, street maintenance issues, Town ordinance violations, and other common issues that residents contact Town Hall to report. Residents are able to check that they are within Town limits and then choose from a number of options to report their problem to Town Hall.

Events Calendar

One of the most popular sections of the Town's website is the Town's Events Calendar. Here residents can see a monthly overview of all upcoming events hosted by the Town. These include monthly Council, boards and committees meetings, special events for residents in Shallowford Square, Town Hall closings, and special Waste Management collections. Residents are also able to filter through all the posted events to see particular events of interest.

Staying Connected

Residents are able to access several different ways to stay updated on Town news through the new website. Residents can sign up for Lewisville Connect, a phone-tree service that the Town utilizes to make automated calls, emails or texts to notify residents of important events or updates. Residents can also find past issues of this newsletter and are now able to subscribe to receive an emailed PDF version of the "Lewisville Citizen" as well. There are also links to the Town's various social media accounts and a link to Lewisville's Channel 6 online.
