Lewisville Plans for Annual Independence Day Celebration

Plans are underway for the Town of Lewisville's annual Independence Day celebration. The free festivities will take place on Wednesday, July 4 in Shallowford Square.

The Extraordinaires band will take center stage at the pavilion beginning at 6 p.m., followed by an elaborate firework display at dark. Concessions will be available for purchase.

"This is always a popular event in the Town," said Town Manager Hank Perkins.

"People travel from near and far to partake in one of the best fireworks displays in the county. Although we receive thousands of spectators for this event each year, the Forsyth County Sheriff's department has always done an excellent job assisting with traffic control to insure that safety is always first and traffic is directed out of the area as quickly as possible."

The celebration requires numerous hours of planning and preparation, said Events Coordinator Stacy Howard.

"We actually begin planning for this event in January," said Howard. However, Howard said the effort is well worth the results with the excitement it brings for the town.

Town Committees Join Forces to Fight Plastic Waste


Lewisville area shoppers now have need for one less plastic bag. As a joint effort to reduce plastic waste in the area, the Lewisville Beautification Committee and the Recycling Committee recently distributed more than 600 reusable grocery bags at Lowe's Foods and Food Lion in Lewisville.

Following the town's Clean Sweeps the committees decided to partner-up and distribute the reusable grocery bags as well as educate the community on the importance of using them.

The Lewisville Recycling
Committee had three members,
George Stilphen, Kay Smitherman
and Russell Bailey, stationed at
Lowe's Foods that Saturday handing
out the bags to interested shoppers
and discouraging the use of plastic
grocery bags, as they are such an
environmental problem.

At the Food Lion location, the town's Beautification Committee had two members, Miriam Marley and Genevieve Athens, stationed at each entrance and handed out 350 bags.

The committees' representatives said the bag recipients wanted a

bag and were very happy to have one. They said many also expressed

interest and concern for plastic waste in the environment.




