Town Requests Survey Response

As part of the updating process for the Comprehensive Plan, the Town has prepared a survey for all residents to complete. Surveys will be mailed to residents in March. The short two-page questionnaire includes a prepaid envelope so that the survey may be returned.

This information will help the town better understand how residents feel about the community and what the priorities should be in the coming years.

"Our survey of residents is an important part of our five-year

comprehensive plan review," Mayor Mike Horn said. "It provides folks with an opportunity to share their thoughts with us and to help guide the future direction of the town."

Town Manager Hank Perkins said he hopes that everyone will take the time to share their opinions by completing and returning the survey.

"This is just one tool in our efforts to be well informed about how residents view their community,"

prank. Standing about 4 feet tall with a brightly painted aluminum body mounted on long wire legs, Pinky first appeared early one December morning three years ago in my neighbor's front yard in Arbor Run.

Over the next month Pinky mysteriously moved from house to house, disappearing in the evening and reappearing the next morning near a mailbox, alongside a driveway, in a flower bed, or sometimes very conspicuously at a neighbor's front door.

For the last couple of years, however, Pinky had been missing in action. Some suspected Pinky flew south or maybe took quiet respite in the corner of someone's garage beside the refrigerator, next to the brooms and mops ... hmm, that's maybe a little too specific.

Anyway, in December Pinky returned, a little faded but still colorful. This time however, Pinky had a Zip Lock bag attached to his plumage. Inside the bag was a sheet of paper and a note. "I've been in Belize but heard about all the snow, so I'm returning to bring my holiday cheer."

In the note, Pinky asked neighbors to write down and share what they were most thankful for. And then pass him along.

A month went by during which Pinky would appear randomly in various neighbor's yards. Then, in the first of January, Pinky disappeared. Maybe he had headed south again. It was very cold.

So, six weeks pass. I was driving home and there was Pinky. Standing at the edge of the street seeming to say, pick me up. So, I did.

That evening I began reading the many notes that my neighbors had included in Pinky's Zip Lock bag over the holidays.

Most often they mentioned how thankful they were for wonderful friends and neighbors. How thankful they were for their children. And how thankful they were for their many blessings during the "Reason for the Season."

They were thankful for being able to live in our

neighborhood. As one described, "where there is always a wave, always a smile and always a hello." Neighbors were thankful for the holiday lights of green, red, gold and blue. Thankful for our veterans. Thankful for the deer,

ducks, heron, rabbits, owls, foxes, hawks and turtles that also call our neighborhood home.

Thankful for kids being home from college. For health. For an understanding spouse. And for dogs and cats and grandbabies. Oh my!

Many shared stories about how, as neighbors, we became friends and then became "like family." And stories about days around the pool and how our lives have become intertwined.

Some neighbors reflected about how we have so much, when so many have so little. Reflected about our parents, both alive and those who have passed, who gave us a legacy of faithfulness, love and laughter. And that each new day provides us with an opportunity to serve each other

And that brings us back to Pinky. One of the very last notes in Pinky's bag said this.

"Thanks to the neighbor who placed Pinky in our front yard. Reading each other's comments is a reminder that it is the smallest of gestures that make a difference in someone's life."

Will Pinky return next December? Who knows? But the one thing of which I am indeed most certain is that I am so fortunate to live in our neighborhood and in our little town of Lewisville.

Special Recycling Event Set for Saturday, April 27

The Lewisville Recycling Committee (LRC) will host a special recycling collection event from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. on Saturday, April 27 at Shallowford Square on David McKee Street.

LRC collects clean items not included in the biweekly recycling. Go to the Town of Lewisville website https://www.lewisvillenc.
net/solid-waste-recycling to find the list of accepted and unaccepted items.
This event offers residents a proper way to recycle items not permitted in the regular curbside recycling collection.

Town Office Manager Stacy Howard said the

special recycling events are vital to assist the residents in properly disposing of materials.

"People often call Town Hall inquiring about recycling procedures for styrofoam peanuts and bubble wrap as well as other items that are not accepted curb side," Howard said. "This recycling event offers the opportunity for these items to be properly recycled."

RECYCLING ITEMS ACCEPTED WILL INCLUDE:

Plastic and paper grocery bags, clean and



sorted styrofoam peanuts and bubble wrap, styrofoam egg cartons, ink jet and laser cartridges, cell phones, plastic

six-pack rings, household batteries (only NiCad, mercury, lead and lithium), residential florescent bulbs, empty propane tanks, corks, #1 non-small neck plastic containers like cool whip tubs and lids, #5 plastic food containers (like yogurt), and automobile batteries.

ITEMS
UNACCEPTABLE
WILL INCLUDE:

No items that are already permitted in the curb side recycling program such as cardboard and newspaper. No glass or other plastics not accepted curb side, no toys, housewares or small appliances.

All chemicals, paints, televisions, used motor oil, latex paint, antifreeze and hazardous waste must be taken to the 3RC Envirostation in Winston-Salem,

Clean used toys, housewares and other small working appliances should be taken to the Goodwill site at the Oaks Shopping Center.

An Introduction to Home Composting

More than 25 percent of the typical household's waste is yard trimmings and food scraps that can be composted.

Composting is the controlled decomposition of organic materials into a soil-like substance called compost. Organic materials, such as grass clippings, leaves, yard trimmings, food scraps and non-recyclable paper products, can be composted at home in compost bins, piles or worm bins. Home composting is an easy and

economical way for individuals to convert their organic waste into a soil amendment that they can use to mulch landscaping, enhance plant growth, enrich topsoils and provide other benefits to plants and soil.

Compost benefits include:

- · improves soil health and fertility
- increases the nutrient content of soils
 - · promotes higher yields of crops
- brings and feeds diverse life in soils
 - · makes soil easier to work with

- increases soil porosity and moisture retention
- suppresses plant diseases and pests
- can reduce the need for fertilizers and pesticides
 - · encourages healthy root systems
 - · helps regenerate poor soils
- can prevent and manage soil erosion problems
- reduces water demands of plants and trees

DO YOU KNOW WHAT THE TOWN-WIDE SPEED LIMIT IS?

If you said 25 MPH you are right. (Unless otherwise posted) Speed limit is the maximum speed at which a vehicle is legally permitted to travel, as within a specific area, on a certain road, or under given conditions. Be alert that other roads in town may have lower posted speed limits. An example of this is Lucy Lane which goes in front of Lewisville Elementary School. It has a posted speed limit at 10 mph.

Fun Fact: On May 21, 1901 Connecticut became the first state to pass a law regulating motor vehicles, limiting their speed to 12 mph in cities and 15 mph on country roads.



understanding ROUNDABOUTS



WHAT IS A ROUNDABOUT?

A roundabout is an intersection requiring entering traffic to yield the right of way to traffic already in the roundabout. This keeps the traffic in the roundabout flowing and prevents traffic backups and delays.

WHY INSTALL A ROUNDABOUT?

Roundabouts help address safety and congestion concerns at intersections. They are designed to enhance traffic efficiency, safety and aesthetics and minimize delay and cost for all users including motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists.



HOW TO DRIVE A ROUNDABOUT:

- Yield to vehicles already in the roundabout;
- Once in the roundabout, you have the right of way;
- Use your turn signal when exiting the roundabout
- *Always* be cautious and look for unexpected vehicles, pedestrians or bicycles.


