During the December 12 Town Council meeting, the newly elected council members were sworn into office and the outgoing council members were honored during the ceremony for their service.

Town Council Takes Oath of Office

The residents of Lewisville elected new incoming town officials during the November 2019 general election. The elected council includes Mayor Mike Horn, who ran unopposed in the election, councilman Fred Franklin, serving a returning term; Jeanne Marie Foster, Melissa Hunt, David Smitherman, Dr. Ken Sadler, and Jane Welch. The new council was sworn into office during the December 12 council meeting. The council selected Jeanne Marie Foster to serve as Mayor Pro-tem for the term.

Mayor Horn has served on the town council for 19 years and as mayor for six of those. During this term, Horn said he plans to lead the Town with the development of a new community center, Lewisville Gateway project, new Lewisville Middle School and the various road and sidewalk projects that go along with the school, road widening Lewisville-Clemmons Road, the Great Wagon Road project and a host of other projects that will be undertaken by the town council and

From your Mayor A Place For Community:

New Community Center Design Approved

n past columns I've written quite a bit about "community building" and why it sets Lewisville apart from so many other cities and towns. In short, community building is the investment we make on facilities and activities to provide opportunities for our residents to get together, to meet each other and to "build" a sense of community through an appreciation of those things we have in common.

When you look at the significant investment our town has made over the years in "places" where community building can occur, several immediately come to mind: Town Hall, our library (we invested in the land), Jack Warren Park, the Nissen House and, of course, Shallowford Square.

Just a few weeks ago, the town council approved our next significant investment – a new 12,000 square foot community center.

Getting to this point took a lot of work by staff, council and a volunteer group of our residents who have been meeting over the last 15 months to discuss every phase of this project. Purposefully, we didn't set out just to construct a building. We started with an assessment of what type of programs might benefit everyone in our community. Who might use the center? What types of activities we wanted to be able to hold at the center? Where was the best location? And only then did we begin to develop a building design to accommodate all of those needs.

In choosing a location for the new community center, we wanted a site that would accommodate the building design with ample parking and room to expand in the future. But we also wanted a site that was convenient and offered something special with open space and tranquil views.

That choice was made easy by Mary Alice Warren. If you recall, Jack Warren Park was made possible through a gift of land by Mary Allice, who grew up in Lewisville. When she heard about plans for a new community center, Mary Alice once again

demonstrated her love for our town and its residents by donating an additional 15 acres adjacent to Jack Warren Park. The property is her home place and she wanted it preserved for the benefit of Lewisville.

The look of the community center is both innovative and modern, yet it maintains an architectural feel that is consistent with our community's small-town character. It is designed to host small groups like our scouts, civic clubs and a variety of other gatherings, but it will also accommodate larger groups of up to 200 people in a multi-purpose room.

It will be a welcoming place, open and airy. A place for quiet repose or to socialize with others.

While we still have some tweaks to make, we are looking for a ground breaking this summer with an opening celebration in the Fall of 2021.

And now a shameless plug. If you wish to include our new community center as part of your legacy, there are opportunities for you to participate through a financial contribution for furnishings or for other named amenities. Please let me know of your interest.

Bulky item collection events are held a few times per year and provide Lewisville residents an easy and convenient way to dispose of unwanted, large items that would otherwise need to be taken to the landfill. Town Hall has received recent calls about the event, so Town staff is anticipating high participation from Lewisville residents.

Bulky Item Collection Monday, January 20 7:00 a.m.

Acceptable Items for bulk collection

Household furniture, lawn furniture, carpet, extra large rugs, bicycles, toilets, grills (no propane) mattresses and box springs (limit of 2 sets per household)

White Goods - Stoves, refrigerators, freezers (doors must be removed), water heaters, dishwashers

All items must be in plain view and may not be bagged or boxed.

Items must be placed within three feet of the curb

Items NOT Accepted

Televisions, computers, mirrors or glass of any kind, household waste, yard waste, dead animals, tires, hazardous waste, chemicals, paint, microwaves, electronic waste, car motors, clothing, shoes, books, general recycle items, liquid waste, batteries, motor oil and any equipment containing oil or gas. Lumber scraps, construction debris, bagged trash, cardboard and cardboard boxes.


