Independence Day Concert Canceled; Upcoming Events Subject to COVID-19 Restrictions

Plans for the Town's Independence Day celebration have been cancelled due to COVID-19 restrictions in an effort to fight the spread of the virus and protect the safety of residents.

Although the Town is no longer safely allowed to host its infamous fireworks show, Town officials had originally planned to host a concert and invite residents to celebrate the special holiday together.

"In light of current and anticipated circumstances regarding the COVID-19 pandemic, we decided it was necessary for the safety of our attendees and the public to cancel this year's event," said

Town Manager Hank Perkins. "The safety of our residents and staff is always of utmost importantance in making decisions regarding events or other situations that could lead to potential virus spread. We will continue to work alongside Forsyth county and the state officials to make the best decisions we can to keep everyone safe and healthy."

The Town has two concerts scheduled for August. It is with eager anticipation that these events will continue as planned. Please stay tuned to the Town website and social media platforms for updates on events and meetings.

The Shining City On The Hill

rowing up in the Florida Keys I lived a pretty sheltered life. We had rich kids, not so rich kids and the rest of us who really didn't know we were poor. But it really didn't matter. We all got along just fine.

Our community was so small, that everybody knew everybody, and everyone knew you. If I got into trouble in Islamorada, by the time I got home to Key Largo, my dad was waiting for me on the porch.

Our school was a mix of white kids, brown (Cuban) kids and black kids. We really never thought much of it. Of course, the black kids all lived in a certain part of the island, but at that time in my life, it really didn't register whv.

It wasn't until I worked at a summer camp in North Carolina during my freshman year in college that I began to fully understand the issue of race - how unimportant it was to me, but how important it was to a lot of other people.

That's where I met Dexter King, the second son of Martin Luther King. The impact of who he was and what he had gone through didn't hit me until several years later when, one night standing on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial, looking toward the Capitol it hit me that a quarter million people gathered in this exact spot to hear his daddy speak.

Dexter was part of a summer camp experience for inner city kids from Atlanta. Today, inner city means black and brown kids, but back then we had a cornucopia of colors because poverty knew no color.

Spending time with the kids and their older counselors was an amazing experience. I was immersed in an unfamiliar culture and, for the first time in my life, I began to understand racial prejudice.

I had studied the Civil Rights Act of 1964 in high school, the riots of 1968 and the shootings of John Kennedy, Bobby Kennedy and

Martin Luther King. But until that summer, I never really connected the dots. I didn't completely grasp the power of prejudice, oppression and hate.

I share this with you because for the majority of my life, racism didn't really affect me. Virtually every door I knocked on in my career opened. I didn't get suspicious looks walking through stores. White women didn't hold their purses a little tighter or pull their children closer when I passed.

I never worried about driving home at night, walking or jogging through my neighborhood or finding a place to

Over the years, however, I grew to understand how divisive racism can be. Yet, when I was out with the guys and one used a racial slur in a joke or story, I didn't say

The events of May and June made me realize that I should have, and from now on will.

Racism is real. Systemic racism is real. Much of it has been tolerated, ignored and worse yet perpetuated.

Today, more than ever, I know I can do better in confronting racism. And I must do better, so everyone will feel welcome in our America, that shining city on the hill.

The NC Department of Health and Human Services is asking people to remember these three things as we stay strong and continue to flatten the curve and slow the spread of COVID-19.

If you leave home, practice your Ws: Wear, Wait, Wash

Wear a cloth face covering if you will be with other people

Wait 6 feet apart. Avoid close contact.

Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or use hand sanitizer.

These actions can protect our families and neighbors as the state takes a cautious step forward to ease restrictions while the virus is still circulating.

DO YOU KNOW WHAT THE TOWNWIDE SPEED LIMIT IS?

If you said 25 MPH you are right. (Unless otherwise posted) Speed limit is the maximum speed at which a vehicle is legally permitted to travel, as within a specific area, on a certain road, or under given conditions. Be alert that other roads in town may have lower posted speed limits. An example of this is Lucy Lane which goes in front of Lewisville Elementary School. It has a posted speed limit at 10 mph.

Fun Fact: On May 21, 1901 Connecticut became the first state to pass a law regulating motor vehicles, limiting their speed to 12 mph in cities and 15 mph on country roads.


