Can You Imagine That?

y grandfather Cecil and grandmother Lulu were amazing individuals. They grew-up deep in the Appalachian coal country of western Pennsylvania on the West Virginia border.

Lulu, a kind but stern woman that I don't remember smiling very much, was a teacher and commuted each day to her school on horseback. This was when we had winters with snow drifts that could cover a house. That's probably why she didn't smile much.

Cecil was a salesman who never met a stranger and knew everyone in Pennsylvania west of Pittsburgh.

Throughout his life, Cecil sold everything from petroleum for Atlantic Richfield, to vitamins, to World Book Encyclopedias. Remember those and how we used to copy our homework word-for-word even though we knew that our teachers knew we weren't that smart?

Cecil was a pioneer. He had the first Ford Model T in the county. He built Lulu a mechanical washing machine before there was a Speed Queen or Maytag. And he had one of the most curious minds I've ever known.

He witnessed and marveled at the transformation of our country from covered wagons to landing a man on the moon. I'm sure he never thought that one day people would be gullible enough to buy water in a bottle and air in a can. If he did, I'm sure he would have figured out a way to sell it.

Later in life, Cecil and Lulu moved from Pennsylvania to live with us in the Florida Keys. My dad built them a house near ours.

I remember spending Saturday nights with them as they danced across the living room to Lawrence Welk on TV (kids, Google it). I thought it was weird then, but now I realize how much they loved each other as they recaptured their early years together, even if it was only for an hour on Saturday night.

When I went home during breaks from college, Cecil and I would walk down to the bay in the early evening to watch the sunset. I would share with him things that I learned and he would say, "Can you imagine that?"

I thought of Cecil recently when I was watching a 60 Minutes piece on the Web Telescope, launched into space in December. Our universe is estimated to be 14 billion years old. This telescope is designed to try to tell us more about the first 100 million years of which we know very little.

While an exhilarating journey into the unknown, what impressed me the most in the story was that all of the interviews about the mission, featured women astrophysicists who were leading the project. Not that long ago, the scientists interviewed for this story would have all been men. (So girls, dream big!)

And I guess that leads me to the point of this column, yes there really is one, and that's how much our little town has changed and grown through the years to become the place we all love today.

The Town of Lewisville welcomes Dora Moore as the new town clerk replacing retiring clerk Joyce Walker. Moore began working for the Town in November 2021 training with Walker prior to her retirement in December.

"We are very excited to have Mrs. Moore join our staff," Town Manager Hank Perkins said. "She has come in and hit the ground running for us and has helped greatly in creating a

smooth transition with the retirement of Mrs. Walker. I look forward to all of the community getting a chance to meet and know Mrs. Moore."

Moore said she has enjoyed getting to know and work with the Town staff.

"Everyone has been very welcoming and kind," she said. "I am looking forward to working more closely with the Mayor, Town Council and our residents."

Moore was hired in November 1993 at the Town of Rural Hall as the secretary to the manager, mayor and council. In 2000, she was named deputy town clerk and town clerk in September 2010.

Moore is an active member of the North Carolina Association of Municipal Clerks (NCAMC) where she was awarded the NCAMC Clerk of the Year in 2014.

She served as NCAMC Program and Education chair for two terms, 2012-2013 and 2013-2014; and has served as district director in NCAMC and NCAMC president 2016-2017.

Moore is certified as a North Carolina Certified Municipal Clerk and a Master Municipal Clerk.

Moore and her husband, Scott, live in King. Moore has two children, a son, Seth, who is a junior at University of North Carolina Chapel Hill and a daughter, Sierra, who is a senior at West Stokes High School.

Walker, who began working for the Town as a contract replacement receptionist in 1996 following a long career as a supervisor with the phone company, said she was eager to take the receptionist position on a permanent basis when the town manager offered her the job.

Walker said she has loved working for the Town of Lewisville throughout the years and in particularly working with the community.

"I love to talk," Walker confessed. "I always felt that every person I met was a family member. Being a part of the Lewisville Civic Club and the Lewisville Historical Society just extended that family even more."

Working with the Town residents, councils, mayors and staff throughout the years will be some of her fondest memories of her time as an employee of the Town.

"Working with the students (on the former Student Leadership Committee) who are now adults and knowing that I was an influence in their life," Walker said was one of her top memories.

"I'll always remember all the people I've had an opportunity to work with, elected and staff," she said. "I'll miss all the people in the town that I've known over the years."

Walker has had numerous accomplishments throughout her career, one most recent being named Clerk of the Year by the North Carolina Association of Municipal Clerks (NCAMC) in 2018. Walker has served as a long-time member of the NCAMC, joining in 2000. She was one of the first clerks to achieve North Carolina Certified Municipal Clerk in 2012 and was re-certified in 2017. She holds the designations of Certified Municipal Clerk, Master Municipal Clerk and a certificate from the National Association of Government Archives and Records Administrators.

Walker said it is work with the NCAMC, such as the Clerks Academy, that is some of her most proud accomplishments.

In the days ahead of retirement, Walker said, "First, I plan on sleeping late for the first few weeks."

"The next thing is cleaning my basement," she said of the mysterious storage place most anyone who knows Walker has heard of.

"I still have stuff in boxes from when we were married that were brought from Maryland," clarified Walker. "I hope to get some sewing projects done."

Walker said she began sewing at age five on a miniature Singer sewing

machine.

Did you know, Walker's love for orange possibly started when she sewed herself an outfit in high school that had orange in the plaid? Walker said she thinks she subconsciously, gravitated toward orange because "it is so cheerful and happy."

"Orange car and anything else I can find that is orange," Walker said of her love of orange. "I even have an orange Dell laptop."

Of course, Walker, the movie-buff, has plans to catch-up on all of the latest on-screen hits. "Then there are all of the movies and TV series I recorded that need to be watched," Walker said of her remaining immediate retirement plans.

Walker leaves her tenure as town clerk with a quarter of a century of impactful legacy.



Youth Volunteer Firefighter Programs Could Aid Area Fire Services

Across the country, the fire service has been witnessing a major reduction in volunteerism during the last few decades. Many departments have seen such a deterioration of personnel that they had to hire firefighters on limited budgets to respond to their calls for service. Because of this decline, recruiting has become a major part of the volunteer fire service. One area of recruitment is the youth firefighter program that many fire departments offer for their young community members.

This past Fall, Youth Firefighters (commonly referred to as "Fire Cadets," "Junior Firefighters" or "Fire Explorers") from multiple departments between Forsyth and Davidson counties participated in youth-oriented training at the Forsyth Technical Community College's Emergency Service Training Center. These future firefighters and community leaders had the opportunity to perform various difficult firefighter scenarios in a controlled environment. The participants rotated between four different stations that included auto extrication, hose line deployment, building search and rapid intervention team trainings.

Junior Fire Lieutenant Nick Robinson of Lewisville said he thoroughly enjoyed the recent training, noting the best part about the day was being able to train with all of the junior members from other departments and getting to meet new people.

The youth volunteer firefighter programs provide teenagers, starting at age 14, the chance to learn about local fire, rescue and emergency medical services in a safe, controlled, educational and fun way while providing departments with an excellent recruitment mechanism. Teens learn real life skills, an opportunity to build their leadership skills and gain an understanding of the importance of community.

The purpose of the youth fire programs is not solely to

teach them about the fire service. They are designed to prepare them to be tomorrow's community leaders and to also build their self-confidence while accomplishing difficult tasks.

"Being able to see the growth and maturing of each member from the first day they arrive to becoming program leaders and then graduating to firefighter is amazing to watch," said Lieutenant Will McBride, who serves as the advisor of the youth programs at both Lewisville and Clemmons Fire Departments.

Lt. McBride started his fire service experience, following in his father's footsteps at the age of 14 with the Lewisville Fire Cadet Program. His son, Alex (14) is also continuing the family tradition as a Cadet Firefighter in Clemmons.

"As a nation, we have witnessed the struggle to fill open employment positions in almost all industries and the fire service is no different," said Captain Rick Washabaugh.

"Local departments in the Triad, contain a mix of both full-time and volunteer staff. Since COVID, recruitment opportunities have dwindled and departments have experienced a decline in retaining volunteers and enrolling new ones. With awareness from this special event and honoring our current volunteers, the area Fire Departments are hoping to expand their youth fire service programs and obtain interest with young men and women to become future volunteers and/or firefighters." Capt. Washabaugh is also an advisor for the Junior Firefighters at Lewisville Fire Department.


