# Bulky Item Collection begins September 26

The Fall Bulky Item Collection will begin on Monday, September 26 for Lewisville residents.

All bulky items must be placed curbside by 6 a.m. on Monday, September 26. Waste Management will make one pass through the Town to ensure all items are collected.

"We want to make sure our residents are informed as to what is considered a bulky item. This event is intended for disposal of items too large to fit within a trash cart - items such as large pieces of furniture, carpet, mattresses, boxsprings and white goods," explained Town Manager, Hank Perkins.

"We are going to provide information in the newsletter, Channel 6, our website and Facebook to give everyone an opportunity to understand what is acceptable for bulky item collection. (An extensive list of acceptable and unacceptable items can be found on page 4 of this newsletter.) Residents may also call Town Hall if they have additional questions or concerns," Perkins added.

The rule of thumb is to avoid placing bags of trash, televisions, cardboard boxes, lumber scraps, clothing, books, construction debris and other prohibited items out for the collection. If Waste Management sees a contaminated collection pile, the site will not be serviced.

Perkins said the collection times are a busy one for staff because of all the calls as to what is allowed, reports of individual homes missed and complaints about people leaving unacceptable items at the curb long after the event has ended.

The staff will be using the Lewisville Connect phone system to contact residents as a reminder prior to the collection. This notification system makes phone calls to everyone with a land line and also to cell phone users if they have provided their contact information. It can also send texts and emails to those who have chosen to receive information in that manner. Residents can register for this service by visiting the Town's website at lewisvillenc.net and accessing the Blackboard Connect icon on the home page.

### From your Mayor

This past month, I was asked to write a letter to the future. This letter is one of several items that were sealed in Lewisville's time capsule to be opened in the year 2066. As a person who earned a living as a writer most of my life, this was a daunting challenge.

We've sought our most talented, committed and insightful of our residents to participate in our town's committees and boards. This is fundamental to how we govern today. If you trust their judgement and guidance, you will be surprised and pleased by their wisdom.

We've preserved the integrity of our town council and staff, which, in its first 25 years, has risen above partisan politics and worked together with respect for each other and a selfless commitment to the betterment of our community.

We've respected the voices of our residents yet we've been mindful to choose what is in the best long term interests of our town. We have resisted the temptation to make decisions under pressure because it may be politically advantageous.

These are the principles on which your town was built. These are the principles that we hope have endured and become entwined in your values.

We can only imagine what Lewisville might be like a half century from now when this letter is read. We hope you have chosen wisely and preserved our unique small town character."

I hope these words and this message will reflect our community a half century from now as well as it does today. As always, I welcome your thoughts and comments.

### Bulky Item Collection Monday, September 26 6:00 a.m.

### Acceptable Items for bulk collection

Household furniture, lawn furniture, carpet, extra large rugs, bicycles, toilets, grills (no propane) mattresses and box springs (limit of 2 sets per household)

White Goods - Stoves, refrigerators, freezers (doors must be removed), water heaters, dishwashers

All items must be in plain view and may not be bagged or boxed.

Items must be placed within three feet of the curb

### Items NOT Accepted

Televisions, computers, mirrors or glass of any kind, house-hold waste, yard waste, dead animals, tires, hazardous waste, chemicals, paint, microwaves, electronic waste, car motors, clothing, shoes, books, general recycle items, liquid waste, batteries, motor oil and any equipment containing oil or gas, lumber scraps, construction debris, bagged trash, cardboard and cardboard boxes

An informal public meeting for the future Great Wagon Road project was held on Tuesday, June 21 at Lewisville Town Hall.

The proposed Great Wagon Road would connect David McKee Street to Shallowford Road and North Street to Lewisville-Vienna Road.

The project is currently funded for the Environmental Document and Preliminary Engineering phase. Information from this meeting will be used to refine the project purpose and need, design parameters, study alternatives and environmental features.

The next meeting will be on Tuesday, November 1 from 4-7p.m. at Lewisville Town Hall.

### Special recycle event planned

A special recycle collection event has been planned for Saturday, November 5th from 8 a.m. until noon at Shallowford Square.

This event is for items that are not accepted in the regular recycle collection.

"This event offers the Town residents a proper way to recycle items that are not permitted in the regular curbside recycle collection," said George Stilphen, Chair of the Recycling Committee. "People often call Town Hall inquiring about recycle procedures for styrofoam peanuts and bubble wrap as well as other items that are not accepted curbside. This recycling event offers the opportunity for these items to be properly recycled," explained Stacy Howard, Town Office Manager.

Recycling items accepted will include: plastic and paper grocery bags, styrofoam peanuts and bubble wrap, styrofoam egg cartons, inkjet and laser cartridges, cell phones, plastic 6 pack rings, household batteries (only NiCad, mercury, lead and lithium), residential florescent bulbs, empty propane tanks, corks, #1 non-small neck plastic containers like Cool Whip tubs and lids, #5 plastic food containers (like yogurt), and automobile batteries.

Items unacceptable will include: no items that are already permitted in the curbside recycling program such as cardboard and newspaper, no used motor oil, latex paint or antifreeze. All chemicals, paints, televisions and hazardous waste must be taken to the 3RC Envirostation in Winston-Salem, no glass or other plastics not accepted curbside, no toys, housewares or small appliances.

Clean used toys, housewares and other small working appliances should be taken to the Goodwill site at the Oaks Shopping Center.
