

Shallowford Square named 'Great Public Space' 2017

Shallowford Square has been named one of North Carolina's Great Places by the American Planning Association's North Carolina chapter.

The APA of NC created the Great Places in North Carolina awards program in 2012 to highlight the number of wonderful communities in North Carolina. According to the APA of NC, the awards are meant to celebrate the hard work that goes into creating, sustaining and improving local communities around North Carolina.

Shallowford Square was nominated for a People's Choice Award in the "Great Public Space" category, along with other community spaces including Salem Square in Winston-Salem. Nominees were then put to a state wide vote with citizens voting for what they saw as the best example of a Public Space that brought its community together. Citizens could vote once every 24 hours throughout the contest.

Shallowford Square won the category with more than 400 votes, beating out Winston's Salem Square and other entries from around the state.

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From your Mayor

I'm often asked what is it that I do as mayor. Other than presiding over meetings of the council, our Town Charter does not delineate any specific responsibilities for the mayor. However, I do believe the mayor has a very important overall responsibility – and that is to help build community.

So what does that mean?

To me, it's being an advocate for those projects that bring us closer together as a community, like Shallowford Square and Jack Warren Park – places where our residents can get to know each other, to learn about our similarities, our hopes, our aspirations and, most importantly, to celebrate who we are as a community.

A big part of community building is to ensure that Lewisville continues to provide opportunities for our residents to become involved in meaningful ways to help guide our future, such as participating in our Comprehensive Plan review process or by serving on one of our town's committees or boards.

Community building may be as simple as meeting with a young entrepreneur wishing to start a business in Lewisville or as complex as bringing together multiple entities to plan for a new road, school or community center.

Community building is being able to recognize our residents who, every day in so many ways, make selfless contributions to our town.

You take part in our community's clubs and organizations. You deliver Meals on Wheels or work at the food pantry or lead a scout troop. You are volunteer fire fighters and Little League coaches. And you visit our assisted living centers, volun-

teer in our schools and look out for others less fortunate. In our town, when neighbors need a hand, we lend a hand.

So many of our residents who have moved to Lewisville over the last few years say they came here because they were looking for a sense of community. We should all take great pride in helping to create that.

As mayor, I am fortunate to have a council that supports me in my efforts to build community. A council that gives me a great deal of latitude to engage our residents and to advance the vision for our community that all of us share.

So when I'm asked what it is that I do as mayor, I'm proud to say that I help build community.

If you've visited the Town's website in the past few weeks, you'll have noticed a welcome change. The Town's website recently underwent an overhaul, with changes being made to the site's aesthetics as well as its organization of content.

"This update is something that the Town's needed for several years," commented Rachel Dominico, Communications Specialist for the Town. "The old website was difficult to navigate and hard on the eyes. There was no visual appeal and the information wasn't always the most current," said Dominico.

The new site utilizes a content man-

agement system that is much more intuitive to use for site maintenance than the old site, which will help staff update information more frequently which provides residents with up to date information in a way that is easy to access.

The new website features an easy to understand and visually appealing layout throughout its pages, including event calendars, Town Council and staff pages, important information for residents, and even a brief history of Lewisville.


The new site will also display breaking news information that will be relevant to Lewisville residents prominently on the homepage, providing residents with another resource to get updates on service delays or other Town announcements.

Bulky Item Collection Monday, May 8 6:00 a.m.

Acceptable Items for bulk collection

Household furniture, lawn furniture, carpet, extra large rugs, bicycles, toilets, grills (no propane) mattresses and box springs (limit of 2 sets per household)

White Goods - Stoves, refrigerators, freezers (doors must be removed), water heaters, dishwashers

All items must be in plain view and may not be bagged or boxed.

Items must be placed within three feet of the curb

Items NOT Accepted

Televisions, computers, mirrors or glass of any kind, house-hold waste, yard waste, dead animals, tires, hazardous waste, chemicals, paint, microwaves, electronic waste, car motors, clothing, shoes, books, general recycle items, liquid waste, batteries, motor oil and any equipment containing oil or gas. Lumber scraps, construction debris, bagged trash, cardboard and cardboard boxes

Since Operation Medicine Drop began in 2009, approximately 52.8 million doses have been turned in by North Carolina residents.

Safe and proper disposal of old medications through Operation Medicine Drop events helps cut down on prescription drug abuse, environmental damage to streams and rivers, and prevents contamination of the local water supply.

Prescription and over-the-counter medications cause more than threefourths of all unintentional poisonings in North Carolina, according to the N.C. Division of Public Health.

The average North Carolinian fills 14 prescriptions annually. Of the drugs dispensed, approximately 40% are not used. The unused medications are often disposed of in the garbage or flushed down the toilet. Both practices lead to water contamination.

In 2004, the U.S. Geological Survey identified 100 pharmaceutical contaminants in rivers and streams. The introduction of these chemicals is detrimental to aquatic life and those who directly or indirectly drink from the water supply.

New deputy joins Lewisville Community Policing Program

If you're noticing another new face patrolling Lewisville, you've already caught a glimpse of Lewisville's newest Community Policing program deputy, Deputy Michael Sutton.

Deputy Sutton grew up in the Lewisville area, graduating from Forbush High School. He completed Basic Law Enforcement training with the Winston-Salem Police Department in 2006, where he spent the next 10 years working for the WSPD.

Sutton spent seven years on patrol, and in that time he's helped patrol and protect most of the city. "There isn't much of the city I haven't worked in," commented Sutton.

After working in patrol, Sutton was an essential member of the WSPD DWI Task Force for three years. While serving on the DWI task force, Sutton helped instruct hundreds of high school driver education students through the WSPD IMPACT program which is designed to teach young drivers the consequences of driving while impaired. While with the police department, Sutton also became a certified drug recognition expert.

Deputy Sutton has been with the Forsyth County Sherriff's Office since June 2016 and became a member of the Community Policing program in Lewisville this past February.

Sutton lives in the area with his wife of 14 years, Kelly, and their two children

Longtime Lewisville fire chief, Alderman, retires

This past April, the Lewisville Fire Department saw a changing of the guard as longtime Fire Chief R. Scott Alderman retired.

Alderman left the Lewisville Fire Department after 15 years as Fire Chief and more than 27 years as a firefighter to work in the private sector with LifeStar Emergency Medical Services, a convalescent ambulance service in Winston-Salem.

During his tenure as Fire Chief, Alderman made a big impact, not just in Lewisville but throughout Forsyth County, North Carolina, and internationally in the firefighting community.

Alderman led the development of Lewisville's swift-water rescue team which is deployed throughout the state, most

recently to aid emergency services in the eastern part of the state during Hurricane Matthew. Alderman also helped establish Lewisville Fire Departments second station on Shallowford Road.

Alderman represented Lewisville on a number of organizations including, as President of the Forsyth County Fire and Rescue Association, as Assistant Fire Marshall in Forsyth County, and as a member of the Piedmont North Carolina's Firefighters Association, National Volunteer Council, and the International Association of Fire Chiefs.

Behind the scenes, Chief Alderman dedicated much of his time and passion to serving the community through disaster and humanitarian relief, volunteering at the Clemmons Food Pantry, volunteering and tutoring for the Winston-Salem Forsyth County School System, and coaching for the Northwest Forsyth Little League.

Alderman was recognized for his service to the Lewisville community during the April 2017 regular meeting of the Lewisville Town Council.
