Masters/Para Cycling Championships National Cycling Event coming to Lewisville in May

The Town of Lewisville will host the 2016 USA Cycling National Masters and Para Cycling Championships on Tuesday, May 24 and 25. Approximately 1,300 riders are expected to participate over the two days of the championship.

The Lewisville events are part of a week of competitions that also include race venues in Downtown Winston-Salem, Wake Forest University and Yadkin and Wilkes Counties. Lewisville was selected as the start and finish lines for the Masters and Para Cycling Championships because of the excellent cycling routes surrounding the town that wind throughout western Forsyth and eastern Yadkin Counties.

"I am very pleased that Lewisville will have the opportunity to host these two events because they will bring a significant number of potential customers to our retail businesses, provide an opportunity for our residents to see world-class cycling and showcase the exceptional quality of life in our community to both local and national visitors," says Mayor Mike Horn. "I am also very proud that we will host the Para Cycling Championship for individuals with physical disabilities. It should be very inspiring for our residents to see."

Lewisville Businesses have been preparing to welcome racing visitors for several months. A coordinating committee of business leaders has been working with USA Cycling on how to take advantage of this opportunity to increase sales over the two-day event.

While the majority of the race course is outside of the town, there will be some inconveniences for residents during the event, primarily where a 100-yard stretch of roadway in front of The Oaks Shopping Center will be closed on Shallowford Road from Sunny Acres to the traffic circle where the start and finish lines of the race will be located.

Sheriff's Office deputies have set up an alternate route from 7:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. both days using David McKee Street and Belnette Drive. Designated parking areas manned by volunteers will also be set up throughout the town and a shuttle will transport participants and visitors to and from the staging area.

From your Mayor

The Principles of Government

As I meet and speak with elected officials from across our state, I am surprised how many of them have heard about Lewisville. But it's more than that they have heard about our community, they want to know what we are doing that makes Lewisville such a great place to live.

I share with them our town philosophy, which are not just words on paper, but a commitment deeply rooted in the reasons why we incorporated in 1991. For those of you who have read our Comprehensive Plan, you are familiar with that philosophy, and those of you who participate in town boards and committees see this philosophy in practice every day.

The philosophy is quite simple and it's built on three principles.

The first principle is the unwavering belief that government begins with our residents, not dictated by elected officials. That's why today Lewisville has a number of committees and boards that are specifically created to develop and review policy recommendations for the elected Council to consider.

Participation on committees and boards is open to all residents and, like during our earliest days as a community, it is volunteers who share a genuine concern for our town, that help to chart our community's future. Lewisville is truly unique in this respect.

The second principal is our commitment to retain and preserve as much of Lewisville's small town character and charm as possible. We are very specific about what type of development we will

allow and how we will allow that development to occur. This is incorporated into our Comprehensive Plan which captures our community's vision for the future. The plan is revised every five years with significant community participation.

The third principle is a bit novel among municipalities. It is to operate our town with limited government - one that is empowered to manage only the essential services desired by our residents. Land planning, road and facility maintenance, public safety, solid waste collection, recycling and parks & recreational activities for our citizens are among those services that our residents deem appropriate.

And of course, holding the philosophy together are our residents who continue to elect Town Councils who have not compromised these principles. This quite simply, I tell others who ask, is what makes Lewisville a great place to live.

As always, I welcome your comments and look forward to seeing you at our USA Cycling National Masters & Para Cycling Championships later this month.

STAGING AREA: Sunny Acres

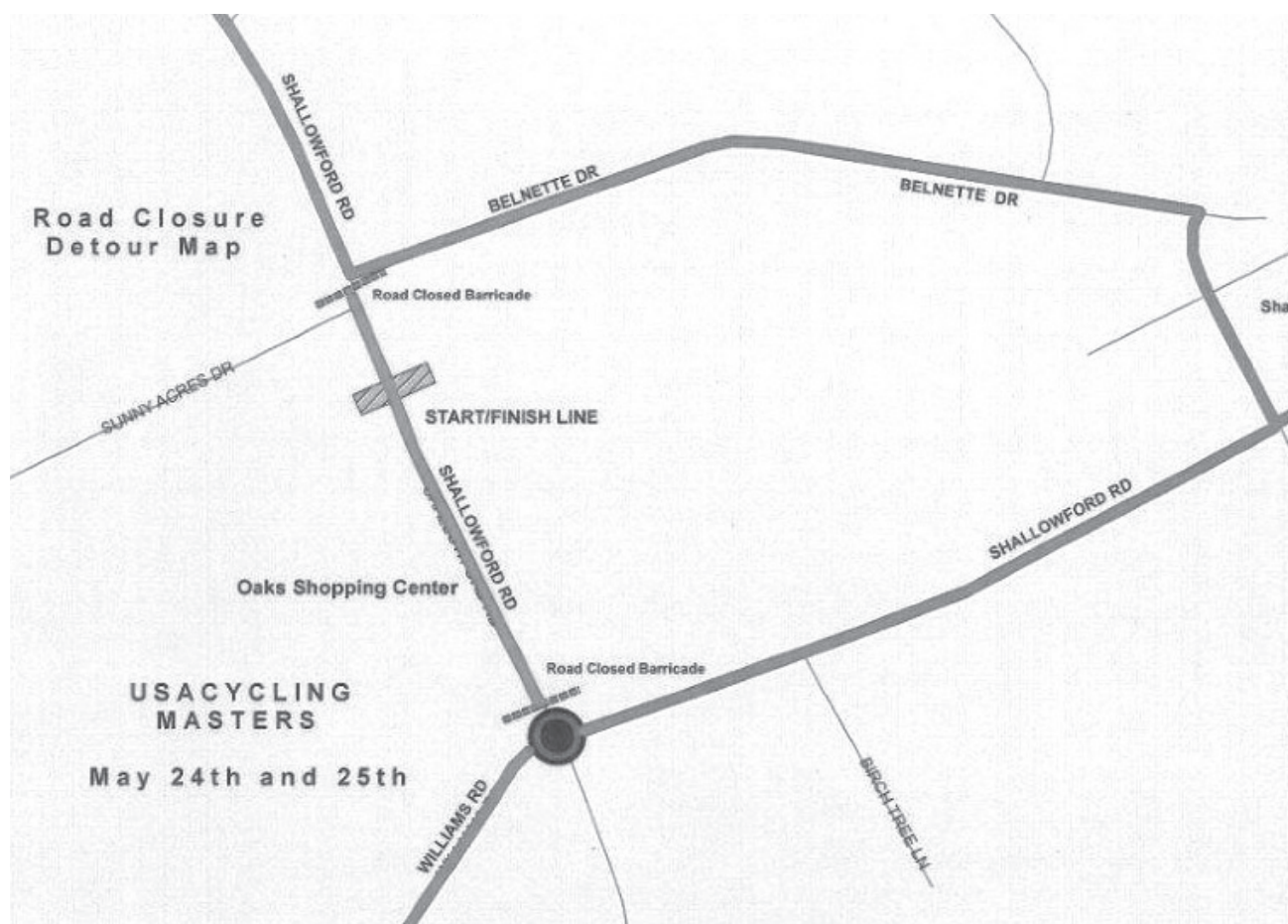
COURSE: Start & Finish Line at The Oaks. The course runs out of town on Williams Road, winds through the county and reenters town on Shallowford Road.

LENGTH: Each lap is 18.3 miles. Total race length varies by participant class

"The town incorporated in 1991 and a special committee has been formed to oversee the celebration, which is set for August 13 from 2-9 p.m.," explained Town Manager Hank Perkins.

The organizing committee is being headed by Town Council members Sandra Mock and Robert Greene.

"There will be entertainment, food vendors, arts & crafts vendors and games and activities for youngsters and adults," the town manager said.

He noted that there also will be the placement of a time capsule.

"We are still in the final planning stages," Perkins noted, "but the July/August issue of the Lewisville Citizen will have an extensive write-up on the event with all of the details.

Landscaping work enhancing new roundabout

By the time this newsletter goes to print, Lewisville residents may see a big change to the roundabout at Shallowford and Williams Road.

N.C. Department of Transportation workers were putting in plantings and trees in order to landscape the area as outlined in the design.

"We believe this will be a great enhancement for the roundabout, which is a prominent feature in our downtown," said Town Manager Hank Perkins.

The landscape work is being done at a cost of around \$22,000.

The roundabout was the first step in plans to create a gateway

into Lewisville from U.S. 421 onto Williams Road.

Funding has been secured for a long-range project that will include curb and gutter, sidewalks, lamp

posts and public art.

"We will have more details on the funding and our plans in a future newsletter," Perkins said.
