LCC Preparing for 34th annual Christmas Parade



Lewisville Civic Club Annual Christmas parade brings hundreds to downtown Lewisville to see one of the largest Christmas parades in the Triad.

The Lewisville Civic Club Christmas Parade will be held on Sunday, December 10 at 3 p.m.

The annual parade, which is one of the largest in the Triad, has become a staple, not just in Lewisville but in all of Forsyth County.

Every year hundreds of people gather in Lewisville's downtown, and this year's 34th running is no exception.

According to the LCC website, "Each year brings more participation than the year before as parade crowds grow larger."

Parade viewers can expect to see a large number of holiday themed floats, dance and drill teams and marching bands from local high schools, along with other unique entries.



The Civic Club's float will conclude the parade with a very special visit from Santa Claus that you won't want to miss.

Drivers should be aware that Shallowford Rd., and all roads leading to Shallowford Rd., will close to through traffic just prior to the start of the parade at 2:45 p.m. and will remain closed through the duration of the parade. The parade starts at 3 p.m. and normally takes more than an hour and a half so please plan accordingly.

Special Recycling Event Planned



A special recycle collection event has been planned for Saturday, November 4th from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. at Shallowford Square. This event is for items that are not accepted in the regular recycle collection.

"This event offers the Town residents a proper way to recycle items that are not permitted in the regular curbside recycle collection," said George Stilphen, Chair of the Recycling Committee. "People often call Town Hall inquiring about recycle procedures for styrofoam peanuts and bubble wrap as well as other items that are not accepted curbside. This recycling event offers the opportunity for these items to be properly recycled," explained Stacy Howard, Town Office Manager.

RECYCLING ITEMS ACCEPTED WILL INCLUDE:

Plastic and paper grocery bags, styrofoam peanuts and bubble wrap, styrofoam egg cartons, inkjet and laser cartridges, cell phones, plastic 6 pack rings, household batteries (only NiCad, mercury, lead and lithium), residential fluorescent bulbs, empty propane tanks, corks, #1 non-small neck plastic containers like cool whip tubs and lids, #5 plastic food containers (like yogurt), and automobile batteries.

ITEMS UNACCEPTABLE WILL INCLUDE:

No items that are already permitted in the curbside recycling program such as cardboard and newspaper, no used motor oil, latex paint or antifreeze. All chemicals, paints, televisions and hazardous waste must be taken to the 3RC Envirostation in Winston-Salem, no glass or other plastics not accepted curbside, no toys, housewares or small appliances.

Clean used toys, housewares and other small working appliances should be taken to the Goodwill site at the Oaks Shopping Center.

The Recycling Committee will once again be sponsoring the Holiday Cardboard Recycling Collection.

This year's collection will run from Saturday, *December 23 through Monday, January 1* in the Lewisville Elementary School Parking lot.

This Recycling Event is for cardboard/chip board, such as gift boxes, shipping boxes or packaging from toys.

The bin will be emptied on a regular basis so that additional items can be recycled.

If the bin is full and your items will not fit, please do not leave items in the parking lot or surrounding the bin.

Lewisville Elementary School allows the Recycling Committee to use the parking lot for this event as a service to Town residents, so please be mindful of this when you recycle your items.

Trees must be at the curbside by 6 a.m. on that day to ensure pick up, and there will be only one pass through town to collect trees.

understanding **ROUNABOUTS**



WHAT IS A ROUNABOUT?

A roundabout is an intersection requiring entering traffic to yield the right of way to traffic already in the roundabout. This keeps the traffic in the roundabout flowing and prevents traffic backups and delays.

WHY INSTALL A ROUNABOUT?

Roundabouts help address safety and congestion concerns at intersections. They are designed to enhance traffic efficiency, safety and aesthetics, and minimize delay and cost for all users including motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists.



HOW TO DRIVE A ROUNABOUT:

- Yield to vehicles already in the roundabout;
- Once in the roundabout, you have the right of way;
- Use your turn signal when exiting the roundabout
- *Always* be cautious and look for unexpected vehicles, pedestrians or bicycles.
